County Institute.

The Wasco County Institute will be held here, beginning July 31st and holding until August 8th inclusive. There will be two classes, Professors John Gavin of The Dalles, Aaron Prather of Dufur, C. L. Gilbert and P. A. Snyder of Hood River, and P. P. Underwood of Boyd, are the instructors. It has been determined to hold two classes simultaneously, embracing every day each one of the ten studies required of teachers in examination. By examination of the program it will be seen that any six of the ten studies can be taken at one course. It is expected that each teacher will select such a course as best suits their wants, and keep to that throughout.

A great deal of time and money is spent on these institutes for the sake of the teacher, and it is earnestly hoped that all will attend. Remember the law requires you to attend at least two days; and you cannot possibly keep up with the school work in the county unless you do attend. Good board and lodging can be had at not to exceed \$1 per day. Any that wish to camp will have a commodious place furnished to pitch their tents free of cost. The round trip fare from The Dalles by railroad is \$1.00, by boat 75 cents. An extension will be planned for Saturday, Aug. 31st.

Interesting lectures and general exercises will be held several evenings. Come, bring your text books, and help make it a grand success.
