A Train Wrecked.
Monday night a rear end collision occurred just below the trestle by the factory in which the caboose and several cars were badly wrecked and the engine damaged. The regular freight, No. 28, had just passed up followed by two sections, special, drawing empty cars. The first section stopped with the caboose at the point named, waiting for 28 to pull out. Conductor Smith sent a brakeman back to flag the second section, but he, after waiting awhile, came on, thinking the train was ready to pull out. He had scarcely got back when the second section dashed around the point, only half a dozen car lengths distant. The engineer reversed the engine, but the distance was too short to stop and the locomotive smashed into the caboose, wrecking it and derailing several cars. The wrecking train from The Dalles was soon on the grounds and the track was cleared by midnight, the east-bound passenger being detained only a couple of hours.

A Remarkable Performance.
At The Dalles, Saturday, F. A. Button's mare Belle Rooney, in a special race for roadsters, met and defeated John Day and John L. The performance was remarkable, the time for half mile being 1:30, 1:33 and 1:29. In making this time she pulled, besides a heavy Frazier road cart, 240 pounds of Button. The mare was taken from the pasture Tuesday, where with her suckling colt she had been running all summer, and made the race with only three days' training. Belle Rooney is a Bashaw mare, and her colt, from that Pacific coast king of stallions, Altamont, should be able to foot it with the best of them.
