Plunged Through the Bridge.

A fearful accident occurred at Portland Tuesday morning, resulting in the loss of eight and perhaps more lives. An electric car, running from Oakland into Portland through the gates of the Madison street bridge, the draw being open, and plunged into the Willamette. There were about twenty persons on the car, one-half of whom jumped from the car before it went over. A very heavy fog hung over the river, which prevented the fact of the draw being open realized until the distance was too small to allow the car to be stopped. The motor man is held blameless, and the accident is ascribed to the parsimony of the company, of which Portland's postmaster, Steele, is president, in not providing the cars with sand pipes. The accident occurred about 6:30 in the morning, and the rails were frosty, it being the first car. The brakes were put on in time to have stopped the car, but it slid along unchecked.

Oregon is noted for many remarkable things, and her fame has gone far and wide in all directions. NO MORE SILVER.

This country came to a gold basis Wednesday. After a great deal of back talk the senate passed the bill repealing the purchasing clause of the Sherman bill Tuesday. During a lull in the proceedings he suddenly put the motion (the previous question), and the bill passed with a roar before the astonished silver men knew what had happened. The bill was signed by the president at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Hon. Carter Harrison, mayor of Chicago, was assassinated last Saturday by a crank named Prendergast. The murderer called at Harrison's house, and as the latter came into the hall to meet him, pulled a revolver, and without saying a word began firing. Three bullets struck the victim, the last one passing through the left breast, grazing the heart and causing death twenty minutes later. Prendergast was possessed of the idea that Harrison had promised to appoint him corporation counsel, so that he could compel all street railroads to be elevated, and killed him because he did not do so.
