THE PASSING CREED.

Time was, when the mission of religion was to save souls, when the churches were literally houses of God, when devout people went for the purpose of worshipping him. In these degenerate days religion seems to have been lost sight of, and the churches, especially in small country towns like this, have resolved themselves into societies for managing other people's business. This is the rule in most small places, and Hood River is no exception. Here no persons actions are above the reach of the sanctified reformer, who drops the subject of souls, and regardless of beams, cordwood and timbers enough to start a lumber yard, that are located in said reformers unseeing eyes, proceeds to dictate from his or her high moral plane, just what the balance of the neighborhood is to be. Difference of opinion concerning religious beliefs have made creeds innumerable, but differences of opinion about other things are hardly sufficient to warrant one sinless sinner (for we are all sinners) in forbidding another sinner to worship God beneath the same roof with said sinless sinner. If Miss Mary desires to be on friendly terms with master John, we know of no commandment against it. Albert Wallace Killed.
A telegram received here yesterday morning brought the sad news that Albert, son of J. W. Wallace, had been killed in a railroad collision the day before, on the Great Northern road, about thirty miles west of Spokane, and that the body was burned to a crisp. W. B. Perry, his brother-in-law, went up on the passenger train last night and will bring the remains here for interment. No particulars of the accident could be learned, but as the deceased was a fireman, it is supposed that it was a head end collision and that he was caught under the engine. Albert was an ambitious young man, of steady habits, and was rapidly earning promotion on his merits. His terrible death is a double shock to his relatives, especially his father, whose favorite he was, and to his many friends here. Mr. Perry will arrive here with the remains probably Monday morning, but as yet no date can be given for the funeral.

Stolen Property.
Thursday an agent of the Rosenfeld Smith Co., tobacco dealers of Portland, arrived here and had a search warrant issued for the purpose of discovering the whereabouts of certain tobacco, cigars etc., stolen from their store by O. Sandman. Constable Olinger served the warrant, and Wm. Edick, stepson of Sandman, at once produced a box filled with a notable collection of cigars and tobacco, which were identified by the agent as the stolen property. The value of the lot was probably \$25. Sandman is in jail, and will probably be sent up for a year or more.
