The weather is the principal topic of conversation in this neck of the woods, and there are certainly varieties enough of it to prevent conversation flagging. The nasty kind is the most abundant, and there is lots of it.

The Columbia is unprecedentedly high for this time of year. Tuesday night the river raised over three feet. The cold weather up about the head of the river will probably prevent a further rise until next spring.

Mr. M. L. Sherry of Auburn, Washington, made a four-day trip through the valley, since our last issue, with a view of locating there. He was running a newspaper last fall and visited Hood River with the Press Association at the time of our fair. He left Thursday for home, but will probably return in the spring to remain with us.

In Hood River there is no apple probably quite so popular for commercial value and shipping qualities as the Newtown pippin. It seems to have held its own for a long time, for we notice that Hooper's Western Fruit Book, published in 1888, has the following to say about it: "There is one variety which will pay well for transportation to the English market. It is known there as the American apple, and here as the Newtown pippin. Orchardists have found it the best variety for shipping on a long voyage, and others can safely rely on their experience."

There is considerable building going on up the valley in spite of hard times. Alby Hershey has just finished his house, and a pretty and substantial one. Mr. Neleigh is putting up a neat house on his place just beyond the I. O. O. F. cemetery. M. A. Cook seems to be quite a carpenter, having put up a barn, cold storage cellar and one dwelling house, and another is under way. ## How Albert Wallace Died.

From Mr. Perry we learn the particulars of the wreck in which Albert Wallace was killed. There was a train standing on the main track taking water. This train had orders to meet the train on which Wallace was, but the latter train had no such orders but would have received them at the station. The engineer pulled in rapidly, intending to stop the caboose in front of the station, but a few feet beyond it stood the other train. The morning was very foggy, the testimony at the inquest showing that one could not see beyond three car lengths. The head brakeman was on the engine, sitting in Wallace's place, while he was in the tender breaking down coal. The brakeman saw the engine when only a few feet from it and threw himself through the window, and escaped with only a few bruises. The engineer and Wallace were killed instantly, the latter not even knowing the collision was to happen. Two oil cars just back of the engine exploded and took fire, and the bodies of the unfortunate men were badly burned and would have been consumed but for being protected by the wreck of the engine. Mr. Perry arrived here with Albert's remains Tuesday morning, and at 10 o'clock they were buried in K. of P. cemetery, a large number of friends attending at the last sad rites.

The West Fork Bridge.

Mr. Wiggins expects by this bridge to reach his stone quarry, and Mr. Triplop will reach his homestead on Dead Point mountain. The latter intends to plant a large orchard of winter apples in the spring. In about ten days the Wiggins brothers will come from The Dalles with the necessary tackle to raise the bridge.

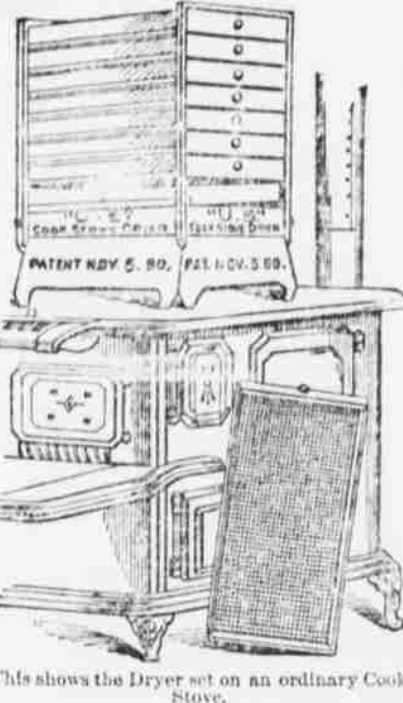
