As in every mining country, the cost of ore extraction and reduction varies over a wide range in California, there being mines in this state where the cost of both opera-tions is reduced to less than \$1. These are, however, exceptional cases, nor are they at all numerous, the cost of mining varying here from 40 cents to \$3 per ton, and the cost of milling from 39 cents to \$2 per ton, the mean cost of the former being about \$2, and the latter about \$1 per ton The figures here given refer to our ordi-

nary gold bearing quartz.

There is a class of this ore so debased that the cost of its reduction is much greater than the rates above given. The expense of reducing our argentiferous ores is also greatly in excess of these rates. some of these ores requiring to be treated by roasting or smelting, though generally susceptible of reduction by the simple mill or pan process.-San Francisco Chronicle.

Director In Chief Skiff and the Work He Is Now Engaged In.

Chicago was naturally very proud of the great World's fair, and the interesting exnibits she has succeeded in preventing from slipping through



her fingers will be shown for years to come in the new Columbian museum at Jackson park. The exhibits are being installed in the Art palace, which hereafter will be known as the Co-lumbian museum, and F. J. V. Skiff, who made such a good record as chief of the mines

F. J. V. SKIFF. and mining departments of the World's fair, has been chosen director in chief at a salary of \$6,000 a year. Mr. Skiff was for several years the manager of the Denver Tribune and went to Chicago as one of the national World's fair commissioners from Colorado.

Director General Davis soon became convinced that Skiff would make a very capable chief of the mines department and placed him at its head. Skiff had been a mine operator and knew considerable about the work before him, but he was not satisfied with his knowledge and at once began a diligent study of mineralogy. He also looked up the history of the mining indusry with such thoroughness that the exhibits were installed with masterly skill. His regime not only pleased the general public, but mining experts were well satis-fled with the manner in which the different

minerals were displayed.

At the close of the fair, when a number of public spirited citizens of Chicago pro-posed the scheme of a Columbian museum, Mr. Skiff was at once selected to temporarily oversee the work of collecting and installing the numerous exhibits that were either bought by the museum or were donated by generous World's fair exhibitors. He gave such excellent satisfaction, however, that the executive committee of the museum's trustees—Messrs. Edward E. Ayer, H. N. Higinbotham, Owen F. Aldis, Norman B. Ream and Martin A. Ryersonappointed him permanent director in chief.

The Art palace was the most substantial of all the World's fair buildings. It was made fireproof and designed to last many years if necessary. It is just about large enough for museum purposes, but so many exhibits have been collected for it that there will be no surplus room remaining when the doors are thrown open for the first time about May 1. There are 138,824 square feet of exhibiting surface on the nain floor and 30,284 square feet in the galleries. The St. Gaudens colossal statue of Columbus has been placed in the center of the building, and it will be surrounded by numerous memorial objects of the exposi

Among the interesting things already placed in the museum are the contents of La Rabida convent, the mastodon moose and giant kangaroo exhibited at the fair, the whale's skeleton, the model of the German reichstag, the Alaskan village, the exhibits of the Standard Oil company and Pennsylvania railroad, skulls, skeletons, primitive ships and canoes and thousands of other interesting objects.

NEW PRESIDENT OF UNION COLLEGE.

Auspicious Beginning of Andrew Van Vran ken Raymond's Administration.

neglected, however, if one may judge from Dr. Raymond's record. He has ever been an earnest student and was graduated from Union with high honors in 1875 at the age of 22. After graduating from the New Brunswick Theological seminary he entered the Presbyterian ministry in 1878, locating in Plainfield, N. J. Five years ago he was called to the Fourth Presbyterian church at Albany and has been very successful in that pastorate. In 1886 he received the degree of D. D. Dr. Raymond is very well known to the

alumni of Union, having been for four years the president of the general alumni sociation of the college. He is a membe of the Phi Beta Kappa society and of the Alpha Delta Phi fraternity, and also be-longs to the University club of New York and to the Adirondack League club.

Union college is situated at Schenectady, N. Y. It was the second college incorpo rated in the state of New York and recently entered upon its ninety-ninth year with 228 students, or, with the allied schools, 485 students. The allied schools composing Union university include Union college, the Albany Medical college, Albany Law school, Dudley observatory and the College of Pharmacy. Dr. Raymond succeeded Dr. Webster, who retires from the presidency on account of ill health.


