Geo. McIntosh brought in the biggest number of crates shipped in any one day by the local union this season, bringing in seventy-eight crates Monday.

J. M. Wilson picked eighty-six crates of strawberries Monday, shipping by the state union. This is the largest shipment made by any one grower for the season of 1895.

For the Fourth of July the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company will sell excursion tickets to any rail station within 300 miles at the rate of one fare for the round trip. Tickets will be good for returning up to and including July 6th.

The large warehouse of the Hood River Fruit Growers' Union is found to be too small for the business of this year's crop. It will have to be enlarged before another year, when the shipments of strawberries will be at least doubled.

C. A. Jaquith of Lyle gave the GLACIER office a call Friday of last week. Mr. Jaquith is a printer who recently located on a claim at Lyle and will go into the fruit business. He is now traveling for Jewett's nursery, and while on his trips sells a new kind of solder for patching tinware that is his own manufacture.
The Hood River correspondent of the Crop-Weather Bulletin says an "out" was made in setting up his report. In speaking of the cherry crop the report says: "The crop is a full one, especially of Royal Ann and Black Republics." It should have read, "The crop is not a full one," etc.
C. W. Nibly, secretary of the Oregon Lumber Co., passed through on the train Monday night. He informed Mr. Bart of the Mt. Hood hotel that he would be here in about two weeks, when he will hire a hall and debate the silver question. He is an advocate of free silver, and wants some one from the other side to answer him.

The employes about the depot, as well as the officers and employes of the two fruit unions, have worked late and early during the strawberry season. They will all be glad when the harvest is over. Their time is so taken up with the strawberry business that they will not talk upon any other subject. In fact, they will not even talk on the silver question, and the other day, our reporter, after failing to draw them out, had to leave them at their work and go to the Mt. Hood hotel before he struck an argument on this all-absorbing topic.
Monday night the strawberry shippers got in late, some coming as late as 10 o'clock. As a result, enough to fill a car was left over till next day. Facilities for handling the berries and loading cars will have to be enlarged by next year, and some day in the near future there will not be room enough around the depot for the teams bringing in berries to be handled. The railroad company should remove the embankment on the south side of the depot and give us another track.
C.W. Chapman of Camas Prairie was in Hood River Thursday. He informs us that the people of that valley will celebrate the Fourth of July. The celebration will be held at H. D. Cole's place. There will be an oration by Hugh Gourlay of Goldendale. J. O. Shaw of Glenwood will read the Declaration of Independence. After which there will be horse racing, wheelbarrow race, etc., and fireworks and a dance in the evening.
F. C. C. Fox, who has been residing on a homestead on Lindsay creek, three miles below Viento, was taken to the asylum Tuesday. Monday, James Chitty and Wm. Kerns took him to The Dalles, where he was adjudged insane by the authorities. Fox is married, with a family of five children. He is a man of good education and about forty years of age. Insanity is hereditary in his family.
The Skamania Pioneer says a man from that part of the country returned from Hood River and reported that the Japs and Chinese monopolized the berry picking business and that our strawberry growers had posted notices that "no whites need apply." No such notices were ever posted here, but it is a fact that his kind are not wanted.
When Mrs. Champlin sold her Hood River property, last month, she presented her father, Mr. George Booth, with a new farm wagon and new harness, sent from Portland. It is a handsome present, and Mr. Booth is as proud of it as a boy with a new red wagon.
June 11th, Odd Fellows' Memorial day was observed by Idlewild lodge of Hood River. The members and their families assembled at Idlewild cemetery, where the graves were decorated with flowers and services held according to the ritual of the order.
Mr. F. E. Bailey presented the GLACIER office on Thursday with as handsome a box of Clarke's Seedling strawberries as we ever saw. They are from new plants, set late last fall, and are of that rich, glossy color so inviting to the taste.
At Mosier, Friday last, an altercation ensued between R. A. Power and O. L. Field. Field was shot through the leg and Power received severe injuries in the face from a rock. The trouble arose over some wood the Fields were piling in the Mosier yard.
Mr. John C. Wheeler says he has harvested as high as 70 bushels of strawberries in one day, from his farm at Vineland, New Jersey. His strawberry patch must have been somewhat larger than the average patch of Hood River.
Mr. Amos Underwood brought to this office Saturday a box of Sharpless strawberries, fifteen of which filled the box. This took the cake. When anything big in the line of fruits or ranch is called for, the Underwood ranch is always in it.
The Indians had a big pow-wow and dance Wednesday night at Capt. Cole's barn. About one hundred of the noble red and dusky maid tripped the light fantastic, while as many whites looked on as spectators.
E. L. Smith, president of the state horticultural society, attended the flower show of the floral section of the society. Mr. Smith says the exhibit was very creditable to all concerned.
