St. Louis Strawberry Market.

St. Louis, April 27, 1896.
 From Arkansas came about 150 cases from Van Buren, Alma and that section; the stock too green for immediate use, packages small in size and boxes slack filled, sales being made at \$2.75 per 6 gal. case. The other run light, about 13 cases of ordinary to good quality, which were selling from \$2.50 to \$2.50—top prices only paid for fine stock early, and bulk of today's sales at \$5 to \$5.50. Tennessee run light, but in one package late and stock rather unripe—slow sale at \$2.75 per 6 gal. case.
 Missouri furnished nearly 100 cases and got in late, when prices were down, sales being finally effected, mainly at \$1.50 per half case and \$2.00 per 6 gal. case.
 Texas receipts rather limited in quantity, but mainly soft and poor—some worth nothing, while poor to best stock ranged from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per 6 gal. case.
 Louisiana had 17 cases, which were in soft, leaky and moldy condition, and sold at express charges to 1.50 per 24 pint case.
 Florida refrigerator stock, of which there was received some 10 packages, most of which came late in morning and was unsatisfactory market; what few sold brought from 1.50 to 2.00 per quart—but the majority of the supply will not be necessary to be carried over. Multiple lots in ventilated crates refused by the consignees.
