From the Planer.
Will and Sam Eccles were at the planer Wednesday.
Frank Davenport was down from the mill Wednesday.
Miss Cora Copple is visiting Miss Ella Davenport at the planer this week. Chas. Rogers and U. B. Kelley are

delivering lumber for the flume at Purser's.
Frank Davenport, jr., has taken charge of the big team, and Emory has taken his place in the yard.
Mr. Howe was down from the Berger place today. He reports the snow three feet deep on the level there at present.
Everybody is sick. C. E. Copple has been laid up with the grip for the past week, and L. M. and C. E. Miller are suffering from an attack of same.
One of our citizens was seen on our streets with his shotgun shooting robins, last week. Hope he will not kill all of them, as they are the only signs of spring we have had so far.
From the Head of the Ditch.
Mrs. Frank Davenport, who is superintending the boarding house, while splitting kindling last Monday, cut off the index finger of her left hand. The hatchet made a clean cut just at the root of the nail, and the portion cut off could not be found.
In rolling logs down the hill towards the mill, one day last week, a big log got the best of the men and rolling too far, struck the pig pen and demolished it. Two pigs were killed, while four others escaped to the woods and it was two or three days before they could be returned to the pen.
Mrs. Shuck, who has given good satisfaction as mistress of the boarding house for the past three months, left for her home at White Salmon Monday. A good cook is wanted to take her place.
The roads are so bad between here and town that one team is steadily employed in hauling supplies to keep the work going.
M. M. Davenport is working a large force of men on the lower end of the ditch and is hiring all the teams that can be had. The work is progressing finely and several hundred feet of ditch have been completed. He has several men and teams from Portland on the work. It looks like people of Hood River valley ought to be able to do this work, instead of going outside for men and teams, but Mr. Davenport has not been able to procure from here all the help needed. He would prefer to give employment to our own people.
Frank Davenport has the contract to build the ditch and flume from Arnold's place to Joe Purser's and expects to have the work completed by the 1st of May. He has sub-let the building of 2,400 feet of the flume to George Strauhan and Dock Gibbons, beginning at Joe Purser's place and going south. Several thousand feet of lumber are already on the ground for the work. Nails and other supplies were taken out Monday. They started Tuesday and will push the work to completion. Any parties wishing to build any portion of the ditch or flume should call on Frank Davenport, as he has plenty of work left to give out, but don't put it off too late, as he is contracting every day.

London Purple
Is chiefly arsenite of lime, a residue obtained in the manufacture of aniline dyes. It does not contain quite so much arsenic as Paris green, and by being a by product, it is not so constant in its constitution. According to an analysis by the chemist of the U. S. department of agriculture, it has 43 per cent arsenous oxide. A later analysis by the chemist of the Vermont agricultural experiment station, it has:
Arsenic (arsenous oxide) parts..... 45.73
Lime..... 24.25
Iron and alumina..... 1.31
Sulphuric acid..... .46
Nitrogen..... .37
Moisture..... 3.37
Paris green and London purple are both dangerous poisons and are peculiarly in the province of the pharmacist, for he is the poison retailer and usually the only one having the facilities for guaranteeing their quality. We keep only the best qualities.

Is chiefly arsenite of copper. The insecticidal efficiency of Paris green depends upon the amount of arsenous acid present, which is somewhat variable, ranging from 54 to 61 per cent in an analysis of five samples obtained in the market. The chemist of the Maine state college found 54, 55, 54, 55 and 40 percent of arsenous acid respectively. It is a very stable compound, does not readily suffer deterioration and may be safely kept in ordinary containers, in a cool, dry place.
