Hon. T. R. Coon has been in correspondence with berry growers' societies in the East and has gathered much 4th and 5th. valuable information in regard to how they do business and their prospects for the future.

From the Lancaster, Ark., union it season. Growers realized last year over \$1 per crate. Acreage has been increased and the patches, having been well cultivated, were not affected much by the drouth of last summer. All growers belong to and ship with the Laucaster horticultural association. The association does not employ any agents to go out and hunt up markets. old soldiers. Their first car last year was shipped April 28tb.

Sarcoxie, Mo., horticultural association reported that 232 carloads of strawberries were shipped last season and the average net price received by growers was 38 cents per crate. The drouth affected the strawberry patches in this locality and not more than half a crop is expected next season, but the increased acreage will bring the shipments up to about the same as last year. Sarcoxie sent out ten agents last season.

This union does not send out agents. Their shipping season begins about the first of May.
