Republican County Convention.
The republican county convention met at The Dalles, Wednesday. E. E. Savage was elected temporary chairman, receiving 61 votes to 31 for T. A. Hudson. N. F. Bird was elected secretary and W. M. Yates assistant. The temporary officers were afterwards made the permanent officers of the convention.

For sheriff, E. S. Olinger, Robert Kelly, T. J. Driver and C. W. Haight were placed in nomination. After the third ballot, Olinger and Haight withdrew, and the vote resulted: Kelly 48, Driver 45.
A. M. Kelsay was the only nominee for county clerk, and received the nomination by acclamation.
For treasurer the names of C. L. Phillips, Dr. Tackman and M. H. Nickelsen were placed before the convention. Mr. Phillips received a majority on the first ballot and was declared the nominee.

For school Superintendent and assessor, C. L. Gilbert and W. H. Whipple were respectively nominated by acclamation.

N. C. Evans and J. W. Hinrichs were named for commissioner. Mr. Evans received a majority and was declared the nominee.

For surveyor, J. B. Goff and Wm. Campbell were named. Goff received 52 votes and was declared the nominee.

W. H. Butts was nominated for coroner.

Delegates to the State Convention—E. E. Savage, A. E. Lake, E. L. Smith, H. L. Kuck, M. T. Nolan, J. S. Schenck, M. P. Isemberg, T. H. Johnston, Walter Frame and Grant Ashby.

H. L. Kuck was elected chairman of the county central committee.

While the names of the Hood River delegates were unrecogized in The Dalles papers, their faces were very much in evidence during the convention. With chairman, secretary, assistant secretary, chairman of the most important committee, three delegates to the state convention and commissioner, the republicans of Hood River valley should feel well pleased.

It was conceded on all sides that Mr. Savage made one of the best chairmen that ever presided over a convention in Wasco county.

A Word to the Wise.
To the hundreds of my Hood River customers I would like to say just a word through the GLACIER for the good of the planter and the success and health of the trees:

1. Remove all labels or attach them to an adjacent stake, else the wind will ultimately girdle and kill the tree.
2. All trees will do better to be headed back considerably. Peach trees need the most and cherries the least.
3. Keep the ground around the tree hoed up loose all the time, whether you irrigate or not.
4. Remember, that next fall I shall have the largest stock of trees, plants and vines in this part of the state.
