The boom of the Hood River Lumbering Co., in course of construction at the mouth of the river, was washed out.  
Mrs. N. J. Mercer is now in charge of the Klondike bakery, formerly conducted by M. H. Nickelsen. Mrs. Mercer has the reputation of making the best bread in the country, and customers can be assured that her home made bread will give satisfaction. She will take cake and pies only to order.  
Hon. E. L. Smith and N. C. Evans went to Spokane Wednesday evening to attend the meeting of the Northwestern Fruit Growers' Association. Mr. Evans is a member of the committee on transportation and Mr. Smith is the vice president for Oregon of the association.

Returns on last year's strawberry crop still keep coming. N. C. Evans distributed \$200.80 Tuesday, rebate on freight on four cars. Some growers got as high as \$10, while others got but a few cents, according to the number of crates they had shipped in these four cars.
