A Solder's Letter.

MANILA, P. I., April 23, 1900. John F. Henderson, Hood River, Or. --My Dear Father-Enclosed find one of the latest pictures of Aggie and staff, with a few friends scattered in group also a single picture of Aguinaldo. On April 27th, after I had begun writing this letter, a telegram arrived from Co-Coand, 38; Steiwer 117. we got there we could not get ashore. The canoes were so numerous that we






