Our Fair. The Fourth Biennial Horticultural Fair of Hood River closed Saturday evening, Oct. 6th. It was the most successful in every way of anything of the kind ever held in Hood River. The large and beautifully decorated pavilion was well filled with the choice fruits and other products of Hood River. Over 250 boxes of apples, neatly packed, were on exhibition.
