GOVERNMENT SURVEYS. Hard Work Is Necessary to Secure Con-

gressional Recognition.

Washington, Oct. 16 .- All the great appropriations of the government are based upon the estimates of the several departments.

At this time of the year the various offices are preparing their plans and estimates for the operations of the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1901, and anding June 30, 1902. These estimates will be transmitted to congress and embodied in the appropriation bills, most of which will be considered and passed luring February, as congress adjourns on March 4, it being the short session.

The estimates which have peculiar importance to the arid regions are those taken the town of Kiu Shan, on East for the continuance of the measurements of rivers, the examination of underground waters, and especially the survey of reservoir sites, and reports upon the cost and value of reclamation of large areas of fertile arid lands.

For Sarveys.

At the last session of congress the National Irrigation Association energetically endeavored to have the annual appropriation of the geological survey for this purpose increased from the almost absurdly sum of \$50,000 to the amount of \$250,000, this being more in accordance with the needs of the country. The increase was made in the senate, but in conference with the house of representatives a compromise of \$100,000 was reached, the concession being made that at the next session the sum of \$250,000 would be favorably considered.


