DANGER HAS PASSED.

Ohio Valley Towns Are Slowly Emerging From the Flood.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 24.—The most widespread and destructive storm, from a material point of view, has passed. It has left a zone of ruin 200 miles in diameter. It was unusual in that it possessed so many different features. Cities 70 miles from Pittsburg were tied up by one of the worst snow storms ever known. While the snow fall was from 18 inches to three feet deep, which is not extraordinary, the snow was so wet that it clung in weighty masses to shade and fruit trees and electric wires and poles, bearing them to the earth. It even settled on steam and street railways like wet sand, stopping all traffic and making pedestrianism almost impossible. The fall was so easy and spontaneous in some places that the residents declare it seemed like the burst-

ing of a snow cloud. A few miles from these unfortunate towns were municipalities in just as dire straits from rain, but speedier prospect for relief, as the rain will run off faster than the snow can melt. Still in these places traffic was practically suspended. Water overflowed and washed out railroad tracks and hillsides came down and buried the rails. In addition nearly every town on the Ohio river between Pittsburg and Wheeling is in darkness. Electric light plants, or their wires, are damaged and the gas in the mains is generally turned off to prevent explosions. So half a million or more people are groping about in the dark. A remarkable feature of the storm is that but few fatalities directly attributable to this cause have been reported. A railroader, caught in a wreck causedby a landslide, and the death of an old woman from shock, are the only ones known so far. There may be others, but as communication is cut off from many populous places it will be the end of the week before the total can be given out.

ACTIVITY IN MANCHURIA.

Russians Will Renew Operations Against the

Chinese. London, April 24.—According to a dispatch from St. Petersburg to the Daily Mail, official information has been received that renewed military activity is beginning in Manchuria Chinese troops are strongly entrenched at three points around Mukden.
