PLANS OF SEATTLE MEN.

Will Try to Get Non-Union Men in About Sixty Days More. Seattle, June 5 .- If the strike of the metal working unions is not settled within 60 days at the outside, an effort will be made by the manufacturers to operate their shops with non-union workmen.
