

IDAHO'S LOG CABIN PRINTING OFFICE

Idaho has a printing office—and a good one—that is still maintained in the old log cabin built over 20 years ago. The Wood River Times, daily and weekly, at Hailey, occupies this odd building and everything about it is compared to the first issue, June 15, 1881. When the daily was started, May 22, 1882, Associated Press dispatches were steepred by wire at Blackfoot and then sent 175 miles by stage to Hailey. It was the first daily published in Idaho. The office floor in the log cabin was stopped, but marines from the Iowa soon re-established it.
