### A Surprised Lot of Easterners.

There arrived in Hood River last Thursday over the O. R. & N., as guests of Geo. D. Culbertson & Co., a party of home-seekers from the Eastern states, consisting of William Westerlund and brother, Ansen B. Anderson of Chicago; Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Redman, H. J. Kent, Menro, Mo.; T. R. Egerton and Peter Franzina, Wisconsin.

The party is visiting the Northwest for the first time and were profuse in their praises of Hood River valley, declaring that of all the places they had seen on their Western trip, none could compare with Hood River valley. Some of the party will return to Hood River and make their future homes among us. They will engage in growing the big red apple and the luscious strawberry.

Upon their arrival they were taken in charge by Mr. Culbertson and his assistants and driven over the valley in carriages, affording a splendid opportunity for the strangers to see what our section can produce in the way of fruit. Leaving the city at 8 o'clock Friday morning, the party was shown the West Side as far south as the Crapper district. Returning, crossed to the East Side at Tucker's, reaching Watt & Slocum's ranch about 12 o'clock. Finding here a favorable place alongside the road, the teams were halted and the party invited to alight, and while they were stretching their limbs, the luncheon that had been provided by Mr. Culbertson was spread upon a convenient log and the party invited to partake of the tempting viands. The crisp morning air being an appetizer, the party enjoyed the lunch, remarking the while, as they dodged the smoke from a fire that had been started in a nearby log heap, "This beats the hotel fare we had on our trip West."

The fruit ranch of Sears & Porter was reached about 2 o'clock. Mr. Sears received the party with his well known cordiality, showing them over his fine orchards and through his spacious apple house. At the latter place the guests were shown box after box of apples, Mr. Sears pointing out the difference between the Newtown, Spitz, Ben Davis and other varieties, much to the delight of the visitors, who gave close attention to all that was explained to them. Selecting a box of apples and removing the lid, the party were told to help themselves; "and when you have eaten all you care to," said Mr. Sears, "fill your pockets," an invitation of which the party was not slow to avail themselves. Their astonishment was great when shown a telegram to Mr. Sears stating that his last shipment of Newtowns, 72 apples to the box, sold in the open market in Liverpool, England, at \$3.28 per box.

"Why," remarked one of the party, "that's as much, or more than we get for a barrel of apples in our country!" Their credulity, however, was taxed to the straining point when Mr. Sears informed them he had but recently refused an offer of \$1,000 an acre for his apple orchard.

The party reached town in the evening, feeling refreshed and exuberant over their ride. They left by boat Saturday morning, feeling well paid for their stop over in Hood River. Most of the party will return to Hood River before starting on their journey homeward.
