Hood River today and Hood River (or Dog River, as it was then called) 50 years ago presents indeed a strange contrast. With all the modern conveniences of rural telephones, free rural mail delivery, electric lights, enterprising merchants, large orchards and strawberry plantations, six daily passenger trains, and with the valley filled with prosperous fruit growers, we of today can little realize that 50 years ago the valley was still the hunting grounds of the Indians, and lives were yet to be sacrificed that the present prosperity should be ours. Fifty years ago it was a two-days' journey to Portland; now the distance is made by train in a little over two hours. Mails were few and far between; now we converse with our city friends by telephone, and receive the daily papers the same day they are printed.

Hon. W. R. Dunbar, register of the United States land office at Vancouver, Wash., died in that city, March 29,1903, aged 64 years. Judge Dunbar was a school teacher in early life. He was the first man to enlist in the Oregon cavalry during the civil war, was state lecturer for the Good Templars for several years, was a past grand master in Odd Fellowship, and in 1879 moved to Goldendale, Wash., where for years he was United States commissioner. He was appointed register of the land office by President McKinley, and was reappointed for another term by President Roosevelt in 1902. In all official positions he was a true servant of the people. He was an honest man, honored among men, and died comparatively poor.
