The price for Hood River strawberries this year will likely fall below the high prices of last season. Market conditions are such that Hood River will be forced to meet the competition of the greater part of the Missouri and California crops. The early berries will feel this competition more than the later berries. The grower who has a mountain berry patch this year will be fortunate. Early berries from White Salmon and Mosier are expected by May 15. The shipping concerns this year have agreed to put the Hood river label on nothing but first class fruit. Close inspection will be made upon crates offered for shipment, and the inferior grades will be consigned to the cheaper markets without the Hood River brand. The grower who puts up a poor pack will not get a chance this year to get his berries to market with good fruit branded Hood River strawberries.

With the state federation of labor demanding the referendum on the Lewis & Clark fair, no appropriation from the state of Washington, little aid from California, and a number of Oregon newspapers denouncing the enterprise as a "graft," the fair managers will need the active support of every patriotic citizen in Oregon.
