The Oregon grand lodge A. O. U. W. at its recent session refused to raise the assessment rates in this state, which was asked by the supreme grand lodge. Colonel Thomas Dealey of Astoria inferms the Daily News of that city that for the past 25 years the Oregon grand lodge has paid its own death losses and hopes so to do in the future. It has had not a cent of outside help. The national grand lodge has never made an assessment for an Oregon death. There was no assessment for June and will be none for August. On the other hand, the supreme lodge has paid \$200,-000 to California. Oregon helped to pay that \$200,000 and will help again, but she does not propose to raise the rate of assessment now established.

The eleventh national irrigation congress will be held at Ogden, Utah, Sep tember 15 to 18, inclusive; 1903. The programme for the congress will be care fully arranged with a view to achieving practical benefits and progress. Specially favorable railroad rates have been s cured, details of which will soon be published. Arrangements for the entertainment of delegates in the attractive city of Ogden will be complete and satisfactory, and reception committees will meet all trains. The citizens of Ogden have appointed a board of control to entertain all delegates in co-operation with officers of the congress. There will be no advance in hotel rates.

Mr. Scott is probably more widely known throughout the United States than any other Oregon man, and is thoroughly acquainted with the conditions surrounding the exposition which he is to lead to success. H. W. Goode, who has been made director general of the fair, is a competent young business man of Portland.


