

# Hood River Glacier.

The Rural Northwest reports a good deal of San Jose scale in various parts of Oregon. E. L. Smith, president of the state board of horticulture, is authority for the statement that there is no scale in the orchards of Hood River. The farmers here use the winter spray, and that pest has not secured a foothold in Hood River. Mr. Smith says the San Jose scale once started is hard to eradicate, as it attaches itself to the native trees.

Farmers are taking advantage of the fine weather to gather their apple crop. Joseph A. Wilson, manager of the Hood River Apple Growers' union, says that owing to the extraordinary large size of the apples this fall, the crop will exceed the estimate of 50,000 boxes. Prices are very good, which assures prosperous times for the growers.

**Young Woman Crushed to Death.**  
Miss Fannie E. Hillstrom of Upper Hood River valley was crushed to death and drowned, Monday afternoon, by her horse falling on top of her in the Bone irrigating ditch, about 12 miles south of town, on the East Side. The accident occurred about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The young woman had started on horseback after 7 1/2 and it seems was riding along the bank of the ditch when the embankment gave way, throwing the horse and rider into three or four feet of water.

Hurt Bellevue, at work a short distance below, noticing the muddy water and having seen the girl go by a few minutes before, started up the ditch. He called to the farm hands of N. W. Bone, and the horse, almost dead, was taken from the ditch before the body of the girl could be found.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday by the Order of Washington, of which lodge the young woman was a member. Miss Fannie Hillstrom was 22 years and 9 months old. Intelligent and industrious, she was highly thought of by friends and neighbors.

Peter Molar of the East Side telephoned the Glacier, yesterday, that he had cut and cured his fourth crop of alfalfa hay. A good record for an industrial farmer.

J. J. Turner and wife returned, Wednesday, from a pleasant visit to their former home in Iowa and Kansas, being gone two months. While in Kansas they were within 40 miles of a cyclone that did considerable damage. In Iowa they saw some fine country, but saw no country that suited them so well as Hood River.

While P. H. Martin was coming down the school house grade, Sunday evening, his team took fright at some boys with coaster wagons and started to run. The wagon struck a telephone pole and turned upside down, throwing out Mrs. Martin and the children. The only damage was the breaking of the wagon tongue. But it was a narrow escape. This coasting down the streets should be stopped.

H. P. Davidson experienced his annual runaway Wednesday noon. While coming down the hill at the Unitarian church corner the brake came off and the team started to run. The team passed Brosius' corner in safety but collided with McGuire Bros.' delivery hack in front of W. B. Shute's house on Oak street. The two teams crashed into Chipping's house on the lower side of the street and completely demolished McGuire's wagon. The horses and harness will also need repairing.
