

Hood River Glacier

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 22, 1904.

A meeting of all the committees connected with the Hood River fruit fair is called to meet at the rooms of the Commercial club, Saturday afternoon, September 24. A full attendance is desired. The Glacier wishes to call attention to the fair management that the people of Hood, who held an apple fair last fall, are anxious to compete for the prizes at the Hood River fair this year, and a special invitation should be sent to the Hunsman farmers. The people of White Salmon, Mosier and Mount Hood also deserve consideration. There is some ill feeling on behalf of a few of the Mount Hood farmers, who claim they were not given fair treatment two years ago, and they don't care to bring down their fruit if the same thing is to happen this year. These matters must be looked after carefully by the managers of the fair.

FARMERS FLOAT DITCH BONDS

The Farmers' Irrigating Co. have floated a \$22,000 bond issue, the first National bank bond issue taking the entire block. The bonds are in \$500 per cent interest, and are payable in from 3 to 10 years.

The bond sale was completed last Saturday, when N. C. Evans, secretary of the Farmers' Irrigating Co., received a draft for the entire amount. That same day, Mr. Evans turned over \$12,000 F. L. Chambers of Eugene, thus clearing up the last dollar of indebtedness assumed by the farmers when they took over the property of the Valley Improvement Co. The bonds paid off to Mr. Chambers drew 8 per cent interest.

When a Glacier reporter called at the office of Mr. Evans, yesterday afternoon, he found the secretary of the Farmers' Irrigating Co. busy preparing his report to submit to the next meeting of the stockholders, which, as advertised in another column, has been called for Saturday morning, October 1, at Artisan hall.

When this report is completed, the Farmers' Irrigating Co. will know "where they are at." The receipts and expenditures of the company since its organization last March, says Mr. Evans, amount to about \$65,000. About \$15,000 of this amount was expended in repairs to the canal, which has enabled the company to bring out 1,400 inches of water, that is being used by the farmers of the valley today. The first cost of the ditch is represented by \$24,000; the recent bond issue covers \$22,000, and the balance is taken up by operating expenses, the preparation of abstracts on the farms for the satisfaction of the banking house that took up the bonds, and for incidental expenses of the company.

THEY GIVE BILLS CLOSE SCRUTINY

The city council met with a full attendance Monday night. Recorder Nickelsen read the minutes of the last meeting, and the first committee report came from Councilman Rand, chairman of the fire and water committee, who reported that Manager Yorse of the Water Co. had conferred with the committee and submitted the following additional clauses to proposed water contract with the city:

The company agrees to place two fire hydrants on the hill at a rental of \$3 each, making 25 hydrants in all, a sliding scale will be used for additional hydrants; the Smith spring will furnish a 20 pound pressure and has a fall of 43 feet; the company is willing to make a shorter contract than was at first asked for, and to cut out the 800 covering additional hydrants, substituting only one; will give free water for sprinkling, and agree to complete the system by January 1, under bonds.

Councilman Early wanted to know if the committee had any recommendations to make. Mr. Rand replied that if the Water Co. had a proposition to offer he thought they should present the same to the council.

Councilman Mayes, chairman of the committee on streets and public property, presented a communication from Superintendent J. P. O'Brien of the O. R. & N. Co., in which the railroad company stated they were satisfied to permit the road to the boat landing to pass under the railroad bridge.

Chairman Prather of the sewer committee turned over to the council the deeds to the right of way for the sewer outlet, from E. W. Hopkins of San Francisco. Prather also stated that the assessment list was nearly completed for publication, but he had just been informed that some of the residents in the west end of the city desired a further extension of the sewer mains, and some more work will have to be done by the assessment committee. The council voted to accept the right of way deeds from Mr. Hopkins, and to pay him \$50 for the same.

The finance committee reported favorably on the labor bills for work on the road to the boat landing.

The bill of Paquet & Clark covered for a year's time and was held for delayed statement.

The bill of Savage's remained on the table.

Graham's claim was left on the table until ex-Street Commissioner Cuning could be heard from.

A communication was read from F. C. Brosius, asking for the privilege of excavating for basement under the sidewalk, and that the ordinance presented with the communication, and covering the case in question, be passed immediately. On motion of Rand the ordinance went through to final passage with unanimous consent.

Adjourned.
