A correspondent in the Denver Field and Farm concludes that the fruit growers in Nobraska have troubles with the railroads much as other sections of the United States. His remarks are as follows: "What shall it profit the fruitgrowers if they raise enough fruit to supply the whole state of Nebraska and the railroads take it all? If the railcoads would give us reasonable freght rates they would fruit. haul 20 cars of fruit where they now haul but one. This would cheapen the price of apples to such extent that people who now buy five boxes would take 10 or 30 and this increased domand would enable the fruit grow ers to dispose of all their products. A car of apples shipped from Auburn, Nebraska, to Chadron, a distance of about 400 miles costs SI cents a hund red. A car of upples shipped from New York to Auburn, a distance three times as great, costs only 75 centthe hundred. The freight rate on a car of apples from Brock, Nebraska, to Waubay, South Dakota, is 25 cents. From New York to Wanbay the rate is only 39 cents. 




