KILL BILL FOR CASCADE COUNTY

A. M. Kelsey telegraphed Leslie Butler late Wednesday afternoon that the Cascade county bill had been postponed indefinitely by the senate, and that the Hood River delegation will be home in the morning.

The people of Hood River have a railroad within their grasp. The capitalists behind the project estimate that it will require a quarter million dollars to build the road.
