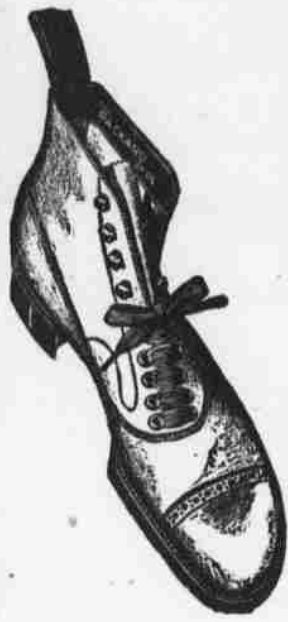

With a maximum temperature of 72.2 degrees, last Friday was the warmest day Portland has experienced so early in the season since the establishment of the local weather bureau, Jacksonville, Fla., and Fresno, Cal., with 80 degrees each, were the only places in the United States warmer that day than Portland. Mrs. Porter McMillan from Husum, Wash., was in the city Saturday, and says the young fruit trees on their homestead near Husum made a fine growth last year, and that Porter is clearing more land to plant more trees. The only thing that is not just conducive to the best results in horticulture as they would like it is that while the trees are very young and tender the snows are inclined to strip the limbs from the trees, leaving nothing but stubbles. Porter overcomes this by driving stakes in the ground and tying the limbs up with pieces of muslin or other soft goods thus preventing the limbs from being broken and at the same time doing no damage to the bark of the tree as would have been the case had he used hard twine for the same purpose.
