### RAIN, MONEY FOR FARMERS

#### INSURES BOUNTIFUL HARVESTS

##### Finest Growing Weather in Years—Great Developments Promised at Young City of Odell.

Odell, East Hood River, March 28.—The past week's rain will prove of incalculable benefit to the country. So far we are short on precipitation, and while Hood River valley can offset a dry season better than most localities, there are portions of the valley yet without water for irrigation purposes, and to these people, less favored than others, this moist weather particularly appeals. Surely we are now enjoying a stretch of the finest growing weather I have seen since coming to the valley three years ago. The recent warm rains should insure us a bountiful harvest.

Judging from present indications an important real estate deal at Odell will soon be closed.

Nearly all owners of property are undecided in any community. We want investors who will become one of us, and who will spend both money and time in aiding the development of the country. Now that the weather is an assured fact this season, there is much development work in contemplation, and many things needed here that would prove profitable to the investor as well as helpful to the community.

Nestling in the hillsides, he has a fine view of the valley and reclaimed until he has perhaps the finest timothy meadow in the regions of the valley. A crystal spring furnishes an abundant supply of water.

The peculiar formation of this little hole in the mountains produces a remarkable echo. Standing at his house and speaking in an ordinary tone of voice, a few hundred yards across the valley, the voice is repeated in an echo that returns as quickly as a wireless telephone, and is perfectly audible.

During the summer of 1893, I spent several days here, and found it instead of his living the life of a recluse, he had plenty of company. The birds and squirrels, the trees and flowers were his daily companions. The birds were singing for him, while the trees and flowers stirred his fancy, breeze snodding to him as he worked away developing what will soon be a valuable ranch. No wonder then that he wants to sell his shop and return to his old life as a farmer among his companions in nature, where no breath of slander comes and where every condition is elevating. Read E. ### SET TREES AT WILLOW FLAT

#### BIG INCREASE APPLE AGREEMENT

Quarter Section now in Orchard—Supervisor Massee Has Started Work on the Roads.

Willow Flat, East Hood River, March 25.—The trees planting season is now here and there will be about 120 acres set on the flat, distributed as follows: Hood River Orchard Co., 60 acres; Davidson Fruit Co., seven acres; Lost Lake Lumber Co., 10 acres; Mrs. J. L. Atkinson, 10 acres; E. T. Foltz, 4 acres, all of which will be set to apples, and E. A. Massee three acres to cherries and peaches.

The acreage now in apples exceeds 100, an orchard only of this amount being in bearing.

Stawberries were found blooming on the flat the 21st inst., while the mountains to the west were bedecked with a fresh covering of snow.

Some of the berries in this neighborhood have been cultivated and the others will commence to a few days.

Frank Strang with a force of men is setting stakes for trees and otherwise getting ready to plant for the Hood River Orchard Co. The company has two places going on the 25-acre piece at the brow of the Straight hill.

Road Supervisor F. A. Massee has commenced operations on the roads. Last Saturday he had three gangs working between the sawmill and Odell at the Tucker hill. Mr. Massee is a lumber and will doubtless be able to secure beneficial results from the labor and money expended for road purposes.

#### Alaska Clover Best for Hay.

Robert Leasure who was down from Mount Hood Thursday, says that he will plant 150 acres of his land to Alaska clover this spring. Alaska is a variety of clover that is taking the lead among the Mount Hood farmers.

"You can get a good heavy crop the first year," says Mr. Leasure. "It is not so coarse as red clover and therefore makes finer hay. The blossom is about the size of the clover, and the same color, but the exception that there is a purple ring round the edge of the blossom. Last year this variety attained a height of four feet on the farms of our valley."

Mr. Leasure reports snow in the mountains while the heavy rains fell here last week. The snow was much needed, for with such a light fall the farmers had begun to fear a shortage of irrigating water. Mr. Leasure's uncle, William Oldfield, who returned the other day from a trapping expedition, states that where formerly snow fell to a depth of 15 feet it was only about 5 feet deep the other day.

Trapper Oldfield is preparing to catch the bear as they emerge from their winter hide. He gathered about 40 martin skins this winter. This he attributes to the light snowfall. A martin skin is worth from 60 to 120.

Mr. Leasure went to The Dalles Thursday evening as a witness for D. A. Hurt, who proved up on his homestead. Clear-eyed Leasure also went up as a witness. Joseph Holden acted as mail carrier during Holden's absence.

#### Snow in the Logging Camps.

During the days of heavy rains here last week, snow fell in the mountains about Green Point to a depth of 10 inches, sufficient to interfere with logging operations of the Davenport Bros. Lumber Co. The snow was wet and sticky and the men working on the logs were saturated in the logs—too much even for the hardy loggers, and they were compelled to lay off until the weather cleared.

Manager Allen of the Davenport Lumber Co. states that he has 70 men at work in the mountains, and both planes are in operation at Belmont and Edithton. The mills are cutting 50,000 feet of lumber daily, while from two to nine cords of the finished product are shipped East each day.

By the first of June, Mr. Allen expects to increase the capacity of his mills to 100,000 feet daily.
