**GLACIER MAN**  
**VISITS ODELL**  
**FINDS THRIFTY COMMUNITY THERE**

Little White Store People Making  
Picturesque Retreat at the Hub  
of the East Side.

Three years ago this coming August, Ewell Shelby began business at the Little White Store at Odell, seven miles south of the city, with merely a handful of goods. In a few months the country about the Little White Store developed into a crossroads village and the community there has become one of the most picturesque and thriving in the country about the Little White Store.

The Hub of the East Side is what the residents about Odell have formed their little village, and well they might. The Glacier man accepted the situation last Sunday to spend his day with Roscoe Shelby and family. He is glad he went and intends to visit that part of the valley often. Odell people firmly believe they have the prettiest section of the Little White Store, and the editor will not dispute the claim.

One thing particularly impressing the observing visitor to Odell is the extensive developments which have been made in that part of the valley within recent years. Substantial and beautiful residences have been erected by many of the farmers, comfortable homes that would do credit to rich cities. The farms about Odell give every evidence that the people are thriving and contented.

Shelby & Son are the energetic proprietors of the Little White Store. Ralph Shelby is the Junior member of the firm. He arrived here last year from Sitka, Alaska, where for several years he held a government surveying collector of customs. He also held charge of the government experiment farm at that far Alaskan point.

Across the street from the Little White Store, Mr. and Mrs. Shelby have erected a two-story warehouse with a large basement on an acre of ground Mrs. Shelby purchased last year for \$200. The upper story of the warehouse has been fitted up and is occupied for living rooms. Here seated in his comfortable library chair in a light and airy room, Mr. Shelby prepares his weekly list of Odell notes, which by the way make up one of the most widely read and interesting columns of the Glacier.

Mr. Shelby has expended a large amount of time and labor in beautifying the grounds about his buildings. The sloping ground about the warehouse has been smoothed with stone, and the trees and shrubs have been planted to give grace, which was just going through the ground the other Sunday, when the Glacier man was shown about the premises. A portion of the acre has been reserved for vegetable gardens, while along the south fence walnut trees will be planted for shade and ornament.

Everything about the grounds of the Little White Store people is excellently neat and clean. No rubbish is allowed to accumulate. The green lawns and flower beds are indeed attractive to the eye. A natural park of pines has been cleared of the underbrush within a few feet of the store. Here Mr. Shelby has arranged to place an acre ground during the warm summer days. No more attractive spot can be found for private picnics. Mr. Shelby has already been assured of an extensive patronage.

The mail boxes at a corner post in front of the Little White Store give some idea of how thickly settled this country is about Odell. Half a mile south of the store is another cluster of 13 mail boxes. Telephone poles branch out along the highways leading to this crossroads, indicating the farmers receive the comforts of a city while they breathe the country air and live a life of freedom.

by Mrs. Shelby to which the newspaper man did ample justice, a drive was taken to Chris Dethman's and from there to Beniah Land. Mr. Dethman has a 110-acre fruit ranch which keeps him on Easy street. The land is in an excellent, and 30 acres are in apple orchard, which shows up well from the road. Mr. Dethman has a comfortable home commanding a beautiful view of the valley stretching to the north, the Columbia river and Washington hills in the distance, and the whole topped with the snow fields of Mount Adams in sharp contrast with the blue sky of the summer day. Some Japanese apples from Dethman's cold storage house were a treat to the visitors.

Those interested in the company have incorporated as the Deadpoint Development Co., the incorporators, who filed articles with County Clerk Bolton last week being A. S. Blowers, H. J. Hubbard, J. H. Ferguson, T. J. Cunningham, Ralph B. Savage, J. L. Henderson.

The capital stock of the company is fixed at \$100,000, divided into 48 shares. Right to a large spring has also been secured, the water of which will be used on the lands in the plat district. John Leland Henderson is now in the mountains with a surveying crew, where he will be engaged for a couple of weeks running lines for the property. This land is said to be well adapted to apple culture. It is located between Ralph Savage's homestead and the hills of the river.

**Case Against Davenport Dismissed.**  
The case against Frank Davenport, president of Davenport Bros. Lumber Co., who was arrested on complaint of Deputy Game Warden Fitz, charged with throwing sawdust in trout stream, was dismissed from Justice Douthett's court at The Dalles, Monday morning.

District Attorney Menefee appeared for the state and E. S. Huntington, for the defense. When witnesses had been examined, attorney for the defense moved that the case be dismissed for lack of evidence. The motion carried with the court and Davenport was discharged.

**Flashlights from Mount Hood.**  
Plans for the most wonderful electrical feature ever perfected for an exposition are being worked out by electrical experts for the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland. A searchlight casting a beam of light eighty inches wide, which will pierce the darkness for a distance of 250 miles, will be placed on the crest of Mount Hood, which rises to a height of 11,255 feet above sea level, and is distant 46 miles from Portland.

From the exposition grounds four snow capped peaks, Mount Hood, Mount Ranier, Mount St. Helens and Mount Adams, can be seen on any clear day. When the rays from the monster searchlight on Mount Hood are directed upon one of the other peaks, it will make the mountain stand out in bold relief, its every crest and crag visible much more clearly than in the brightest sunlight. It is estimated that the flash on Mount Ranier, which is 100 miles from Mount Hood, could be seen plainly on a clear night from cities on Puget Sound, such as Seattle and Tacoma, and that vessels 220 miles off coast could make out plainly the white beam in the sky.
