BERRY MARKET PROMISES WELL.

HOOD RIVER BERRIES LEAD ALL.

E. A. Franz Returns Convinced There is No Place Like Home—Talks On Fruit Situation.

After a trip through the principal cities of Eastern Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, E. A. Franz returned more firmly convinced than ever that Hood River is the best section of the Pacific Northwest. "I was glad to see the green trees and waving grass as we came into sight of Mosier. It was the first glimpse I had seen since I left Hood River berry harvest will be in earnest."

Mr. Franz expects a very good crop this year. Two years ago his four-acre patch netted him above all expenses \$1350. Mr. Zeigler also raised tomatoes on the same ground after the berry crop was harvested, which netted him \$700 more. Here is an income of \$2000 net from four acres.

HOOD RIVER'S GROWTH ASTOUNDS DALLES MAN.

"To the person visiting Hood River valley at the present time, and who in former years was acquainted with the place, the growth is phenomenal and very wonderful," remarked Hon. John Mitchell of The Dalles, after a drive through the valley with Leslie Butcher, president of Butler & Co's bank.

"The valley has always had the reputation of being the most desirable summer resort in Oregon," continued Mr. Mitchell, "but during the last few years it has risen to an industrial development to an extent that has surprised even its most sanguine adherents."

"For a distance of fifteen to seventeen miles, lands have been planted in fruit orchards, the output of which has been increased by the planting of alfalfa, and something like a page from the Arabian Nights; yet every statement made, that seems exaggerated, is backed by facts and figures which cannot be disputed."

"The substantial growth of the town in substantial structures bespeaks the development of natural resources. Fruit and lumber have been the factors that have brought this about, and the improvement in the future will be as marked as those in the past."

"With a fall of 75 feet to the mile for twelve miles, Hood River furnishes water power sufficient to turn the wheels of the manufacturers of the state; the virgin forest that will furnish an unlimited supply for generations yet to come, and the acres of land yet to be devoted to fruit culture are the incentives to business enterprise and commercial confidence in the future of a town that has hardly left its cradle."

"While fully matured, its growth is astonishing as that of any city in the great Northwest."

E. H. Shepard tells a good story on how his father was convinced that Hood River apples have no equals.

"My father," said Mr. Shepard, "learned the orchard business as a boy in New England, and after mining in early days in California had a large orchard in San Jose, and afterward in Marysville, Cal. But like all men of the old school, he was one of those individuals who always got the best seedlings and the best apples came from Hood River, and as he was one of these individuals who always got the best seedlings, some Hood Rivers and carried them back to California."

When he returned home they had just received the five boxes I sent him last fall. After eating some of them he at once admitted they were the finest apples he ever saw in his life. He never said a thing about New England apples afterwards."

HAMBURG FIRM AFTER APPLES.

WOULD BUY DIRECT FROM HERE

Union Receives Letter from Large German Wholesale Firms Anxious for Fine Fruit.

The fame of the Hood River apple has spread to the continent of Europe, and now comes a request from a large Hamburg commission house asking for the privilege of handling Hood River apples direct from the hands of the apple growers' union.

The following letter came to Manager Shepard last week. For business reasons the name of the firm has been withheld. The letter was as follows: "Hamburg, April 7, 1905—Apple Growers' Union, Hood River, Ore.—Gentlemen: After several efforts we finally secured your address through Mr. Daniels of Stuttgart, who also informed us that you do a large export business in fancy fruits. Taking the position that you perhaps would like to be represented in Germany, and if that should be the case, now is a time to depend on a few small time trials in the future but through our house we represented to the entire retail trade of the whole empire. We beg of you to give us information as to what you ship and your commissions, etc."

"We see you under separate cover by registered mail a small album, with views showing our different establishments between Hamburg and Munich to show that our firm is the largest of its kind in Germany and that we are in a position to pay an article that is fit for the German market before the trade to the best advantage for the shipper."

"We cover Germany regularly by fifty of our own travelling salesmen, besides all the small agencies which we have established through the empire. All the large banks can give you information in regard to the business and financial standing of our firm."

A glance through the album of views shows this firm to have an extensive line of establishments throughout the German empire. Five hundred people are in the employ of the company as salesmen, office hands, etc."

"We frequently have found the wholesale price of apples in London and Hamburg, and after figuring out commission charges and freight rates realize that a considerable profit is made by the numerous dealers through whose hands the fruit has heretofore passed, and realize that if we get Hood River apples directly into the hands of the wholesalers of Europe it will mean higher prices for the growers," said E. A. Franz of the Fruit Growers' union.

"The fact that the wholesalers and importers are asking us to do business with them directly, leads us to believe the union can accomplish much in this line. The shipping unions are doing a great work for the growers, though many of them do not realize this as yet, and after a few more years systematic search for markets has been done by Mr. Shepard last year, the Hood River apple men can rest assured that when apples are produced here to the million a year that it will be possible for the union to properly distribute the fruit so as to return the growers the highest net profit obtainable by anyone."

STATE CAMP ELECTS C. U. DAKIN CLERK.

C. U. Dakin returned Thursday afternoon from Baker City where he represented the local camp of the Modern Woodmen of America at the state camp of the order. Dakin was the official delegate from Wasco county and returned with the title of state clerk.

Dakin says the Woodmen of America at Baker City, and that he has not had such a good time for many months. Dakin made a strong pull for holding the next state meeting in Hood River, but as Eastern Oregon was the majority in the conventions in recent years, the delegates decided in favor of Ashland for 1907.

The election of officers resulted as follows: H. G. King, Forest Grove, state counselor; C. U. Dakin, Hood River, clerk; J. J. Gottfried, Portland, adviser; T. W. Crawson, Ashland, banker; J. Stevenson, Astoria, excise; W. G. Grant, Scottsburg, watchman; J. K. Seiler, Gresham, excise.

The following were elected delegates to the national convention at Milwaukee, June 20 of this year: O. B. Munt, Baker City; R. W. Foster, Portland; F. A. Baker, Salem; Albert Wood, T. U. Coll. Sumnerville; W. T. Vaughn, Portland; Rev. W. T. Golder, Grants Pass.

Wednesday night the delegate were tendered an elaborate banquet in the convention hall. There were specialties and toastmaster's work on an orchard. On the western Oregon delegates boarded No. 1 for their homes. Tuesday evening the Woodmen were entertained by local talent at the Baker City opera house.

Fine Fruit Crop in Booth Orchard.

S. P. Waterbury, who is in charge of the Booth place at Willow Flat, on property of Mrs. J. L. Atkinson of Portland, states that there will be a full crop of all fruit at Willow Flat. The cherry trees are heavily loaded. These are will be a full crop and the apples he says never did so heavy.

Mr. Waterbury does not believe in using toxic substances on an orchard, but it is applied judiciously to the fruit and it is a great benefit. He first begins about July 1; lets the ground turn up before putting on more water, and just before the fruit matures he waters the ground for the last time. This way the fruit is properly filled and the sap comes early in the season, which fertilizes the trees from early old stumps.
