CREAMERY OR CREAM ROUTE

FARMERS DISCUSS THE SUBJECT

Enthusiastic Meeting Saturday Afternoon—Roswell Shelley Presides as Chairman.

A representative gathering of farmers and others interested in the establishment of a creamery or cream route in Hood River valley met in the rooms of the Commercial club Saturday afternoon. That a creamery or cream route would be a good thing for the valley seemed to be the opinion of all present. Which of the two propositions is the best to consider, and what appears to be the unsettled question.

A committee with a member from each of the school districts was finally appointed, whose business it will be to find out the number of cows in the valley, and how many would likely be secured if a cream route were established; this committee to report at a meeting to be held by Chairman Shelley in the near future.

At the next meeting, it is expected that a representative of some Portland creamery will be present to explain the details of such a route. At the same time some permanent organization will be perfected and a movement started toward securing a creamery or a cream route.

The meeting was called to order on the motion of A. C. Staten to make Roswell Shelley, chairman of the committee, the permanent chairman. The objects of the meeting were stated by Mr. Shelley, and remarks called for from those present. Views on the subject were expressed as follows:

Mr. Statten said: "I am deeply interested in the subject of a creamery, and I believe it is something far ahead of any of our other interests. We must not stoke all our interests in two crops. Three years ago one of the business men of the valley told me I was foolish not to plant my 30 acres all to berries. 'Why,' he says, 'the business cannot be overdone. One corner of Chicago can take all the strawberries Hood River can raise.' Had I taken his advice, I would have been bankrupt today."

H. M. Abbott—Statistics prove that it is profitable to operate creameries in a country of high priced land. It will pay better than any other crop, and the creamery business will return an income to the farmer every month of the year. What other crop will do this? It enables the farmer to look after such by-products as calves and hogs, which are not so well converted into good money.

Personally, I am in favor of a creamery as against a cream route. The home consumption of butter is no small item. Let us give employment to home labor, and work for home industry.

R. F. Shoemaker—I am decidedly in favor of a creamery. I do not think we could realize as much on a route as from a creamery. It would be a good plan to establish a route at first. This would give some idea as to the profit in the business, and it would give the farmers an opportunity to see the creamery in operation. Then if they decide that a local creamery would pay better, we could arrange to establish one here.

ELLIOTT'S STORY ONLY A BLIND

Right of Way Agent Displeas Fears That Other Company Seeks North Bank Route.

White Salmon, July 4.—The people of White Salmon do not believe for one moment that the Northern Pacific is not back of the railroad project along the north bank. When A. R. Upright, who is securing the right of way for the Columbia River Navigation company, was shown the statement in the press dispatches that President Elliott of the Northern Pacific would positively not build along the north bank, he smiled broadly and remarked: "Why we are the Columbia River Navigation company."

Mr. Upright has given a trifle confidential with a number of new made friends and has convinced many that he is working indirectly for the Northern Pacific, and that the statement given out by President Elliott was all a bluff, so as not in the least to interfere with or retard the work of those who are now out securing right of ways. The scheme is, it is said, to connect with the Northern Pacific at Pasco.

There has been a great deal of trouble so far in gaining options. Those who live along the valley are not in the least busy about signing contracts. S. C. Ziegler, chief of the survey, has been in the valley asking for the right of way, but the people here are not in the least interested in the project. The survey is being conducted in the most efficient manner, but the people here are not in the least interested in the project.

It is understood that he will hold out for heavy damages, as the right of way will likely injure the business of the valley. The statement made last week in the Gleaner that T. W. Mr. Upright, when asked confidentially as to who was back of the Columbia River Navigation company and what road would be benefited admitted that it was the Northern Pacific and that connection would be made at Pasco.

White Salmon is stirred up over the railroad movement and the merchants are going to make the light of their lives to hold the city and to get a depot here. If it should be arranged that Lyle, Bingen and Underwood include Hood River, which goes a long way towards explaining Wasco's pre-eminence, and one of Hood River's good men, G. R. Castner, is in charge. It should not be inferred that Hood River is all of Wasco county, even from the fruit-growing standpoint, for even without the aid of Hood River, Wasco county could keep any other county in the Northwest hustling to keep even in the matter of fruit display.

Those who have heretofore been backward in the movement are now some of the most enthusiastic over the project. You get the railroad on all hands and there is no other topic of conversation. The ladies talk about it over the tea cups and the men at the road, at the lodge, and on the corner.
