IS AFTER MORE RIGHT OF WAY

RAILROAD MAN AT UNDERWOOD
Closes With Several of the Farmers Under the Bluff—But Few Settlements to Make

A. R. Upright of Tacoma, the right of way man for the Columbia River Navigation company was in Hood River Monday. He was seen at his hotel by a Glacier representative and he was asked for news of the proposed new road. "Tell me something that is positive?" he was asked. "The only positive thing that I know, is that a road is going down the north bank of the Columbia river."

Mr. Upright is a man who has had an am sure of that. By whom I cannot say and if I knew I would disclose. But you can rest assured of one fact, and that is that a road is to be built. I am back here and closing up all the deals we have made since we have been holding out the owners that we are going to build a road. I have talked to most all the owners and explained to them that it is to their advantage to close with me, for I am confident that I will give them more than double what they would get if we are forced to inaugurate condemnation proceedings. The securing of a right of way has been a serious task. There are too many of the ranchers who are holding out prices that are all out of reason. I have attempted to be fair with them and in many cases have offered prices that are far in excess of the real value.

"Of course I have been handicapped to a certain extent in not being able to just tell where the stakes of the new survey will be. Our engineering corps is working as fast as possible, but it will be some weeks before the engineer will be able to get in at this point. It may be possible that when he does come, and the changes made in the old survey that we are now following out in hopes of securing the land will allow me an opportunity of telling the owners just where we are going to go and just what we are going to do."

Mr. Upright left on Monday evening for White Salmon to take the matter up with those who have been holding out for more money. The greatest stumbling block that has so far been encountered by those securing a right of way, is the lack of a definite expression of just what will be done. Some hold out and demand that a deposit be placed on the farm. If a deposit was placed on every farm where it is desired that a road be built, the road, supposed to be the Northern Pacific, would be about every farm.

Owing to the high prices that are being placed upon a great deal of the land it is suggested that the assessment will be one of the busy individuals when it comes time to make the assessment. If the assessor should attempt to assess the land at prices held by many who have been holding out for more money, the greatest stumbling block that has so far been encountered by those securing a right of way, is the lack of a definite expression of just what will be done.

CLOSING AT UNDERWOOD.

Mr. Upright is Experiencing Very Little Difficulty There.

Underwood, Wash., Aug. 7.—The railroad talk has broken out in a fresh spot. For a few weeks nothing was doing and many who had been keyed up to the very highest pitch over the proposed road, were about ready to give the matter up as just a little more railroad gossip. Without any notice or stir, A. R. Upright, the right of way man has been working from Stevenson along the bluff near Underwood, for the past few days.

He has closed with some of those who have been convinced that it is a sure job. He has made negotiations with H. J. Knapp, R. E. Hoxie, E. Delo, R. Jansen and Mrs. Ramsey. When this transaction is completed it practically closes all the land along the right of way, proposed, with the exception of Annes Underwood and Captain Harry Olson. There are a number of others who have homesteads who have not as yet gained a title who are waiting for arrangements to be made.

One of the most objectionable spots along the line would be the "log shoot" owned by the Menominee Lumber Company. It is understood that Mr. Upright had a conference with C. W. Cameron and the matter of the log shoot thing when the time came for the contract.

Will Build Farther South.

The Great Southern will no doubt build farther south than Defur, and the object is to open up a large section of country in the interior, which will yield abundantly in cereal growths. This road will also furnish a market for the valuable lumber, millions of feet of which abound in the forests in that region.

The railroads in Oregon have heretofore done very little for the interior of the state, and the people will welcome a competitor in Eastern Oregon which will deal fairly with the whole state, and the Harriman system will not do this. It is believed the Great Southern is independent of the dominating influence of this great railroad king, and it has been surmised that it under the control of J. J. Hill, who has proved himself the most public-spirited railroad builder in

ELECTION FOR DITCH BONDS ON SATURDAY

Saturday, August 12, is the date for voting on the proposed bond issue for the Barrett irrigating district. The proposed issue is for \$20,000, or whatever sum thereunder is required for construction of the ditch from Green Point to a point in the upper valley connecting with the laterals of the present system of the Water Supply Co. also the purchase of the stock of this company, which is held for \$9,000.

There has been little opposition to the proposed bond issue, and the directors of the district are confident of the success of the election. The board of directors have secured a recent estimate from their engineer, from which the following figures are taken:

Estimated cost of new ditch for Green Point to Ditch creek \$23,000; taking up the present system of the Water Supply Co., \$9,000; ditches on the west side of the district enlarging of old ditches, rights of way and grading ditch to Divers creek if route proves practical, about \$12,000, making the grand total close to \$50,000.

The election will be held in the Barrett school house. Polls will be open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 7 at night. The judges for the election are: J. F. Helme, J. O. Eastman and J. W. Ingalls. Clerks, L. H. Arneson, John Castner and L. Dinmore.
