### General Outlook for Apple Crop.

The Fruitman's Guide, July 29, gave an interesting illustration of two ways of looking at a thing. It contained a large number of reports from apple buyers and apple raisers as to the crop soon to be gathered. One buyer wonders where an outlet is to be found for the surplus, and the others are unanimous in declaring that there are plenty of apples and that buyers stand to lose heavily unless they buy at low figures. When it comes to the growers it is another story. In the Hudson river valley the crop is reported as one third; in Western New York the estimate varies from 20 to 40 per cent as an average crop, the greater number putting their estimate between 30 and 40 per cent. In New England there is much discrepancy in reports. The Illinois crop, reported large by buyers, is placed by a grower at half the usual amount. F. Wellhouse reports that eastern Kansas will have from one-fourth to one-third of a crop, while western Kansas and some counties in central Kansas will have a full crop. The Michigan crop is placed at 50 to 60 per cent of the usual yield is expected. Nova Scotia reports prospects for less than half a crop. The reports from Ontario indicate about half a crop for that province. The Pajaro Valley, California, expects a large crop.

### PEOPLE WANT SEWER SYSTEM

REALIZE THE IMMEDIATE NEED

Mass Meeting Instructs Council to Bond for Outfall and to Assess for Branch Systems.

That the people of Hood River desire a sewer system was made very evident at the public meeting in the rooms of the Commercial club last Friday night.

On motion of V. C. Brock, the city council was urged to take steps toward bonding the city for the cost of constructing the main outfall of the sewer system, and that branch sewers be paid for by direct assessment of the property benefited. The motion prevailed unanimously.

Messrs. Paget & Clark, engineers employed by the city, caused to be prepared plans and specifications for the proposed sewer system were present at the meeting. Mr. Paget stated that for flushing the sewers 2500 or 3000 gallons of water would be required daily. This would increase to 1000 gallons when the whole system is completed.

H. F. Davidson of the Hood River Electric Light, Power and Water Co., was present, and at once stated that his company would be pleased to supply the city with the amount of water, free. This rather settled the question of water for flushing the sewers, and as all at the meeting appeared heartily in favor of constructing a system at once, the city can now look for some definite action in the matter.

Truman Butler was made chairman of the meeting. He spoke strongly in favor of a sewer system for the city, and called for others to express their views on the same subject.

Mr. Moo stated the situation of the sewer problem as it stood at present with the city council, and announced himself strongly in favor of constructing the system at once. He declared it was imperative that Hood River build a sewer system for the health and safety of the lives of the people here.

T. T. Winans favored the construction of a sewer system, and suggested that some action be taken at the same time to keep the streets of the city clear of unsightly rubbish.

H. F. Davidson wanted to know if there was anything in the recent amendment to the city charter, which limited the methods of financing the construction of a sewer system. No one present was able to answer the question, but Commissioner Early of the sewer committee, who came into the meeting later, stated that the city charter amendment had been specially framed with the idea that the city should be able to construct a sewer system at once, and that the city should be able to bond for the cost of the main outfall, and to tax the property by direct assessment for building the branch lines.

The cost of a sewer system, as surveyed by Paget & Clark, is to extend from the intersection of First and River streets to the stream of Hood river, a distance of 1385 feet. The estimated cost of this outfall is \$170,000.

E. O. Ryan said he had a septic tank which was working perfectly, and personally he had no need for a sewer system, yet he was anxious to see the city build one, and stated that he would cheerfully pay his proportion of the cost whenever called upon. He considered it high time the city installed an adequate system.

V. C. Brock considered that the people should think of the future, and not of the present. He said he would build the system at once, let us build part now and add to it in the future. He has let other cities suffer much smaller cities than Hood River, and he said the sewer system recently installed in Wasco, a town less than half the size of Hood River.

Mr. Brock urged all to put their shoulders to the wheel in a united effort for the public good, to rid themselves of personal prejudices, to be broad minded in public matters.

"We need a sewer system," said E. B. Hartness. "I have a good cesspool, and could do without a sewer system myself, but I am willing to pay my share of the expense of constructing the system. The only question in the matter in my mind is the manner of making the assessment, and to me a direct tax per lot appears the only equitable way. If a man has too many lots, let him sell part of them."

Commissioner Early believed the matter of direct assessment should be left to the city council. The people on the hill, said he, were willing to help pay for the main outfall, but as the bill makes it much cheaper to build branch systems there, the property holders did not consider it fair and equal that they should be taxed for the expensive work in the lower part of the town. They would object much to the \$75,000 assessment per lot for the whole system.

### WASCO CO. HAS 15,895 PEOPLE

OVER ONE-THIRD IN WEST END

Hood River Valley and City Have a Population of 4674—Mosier 625; Cascade Locks 402.

Hood River valley and town, according to the assessor's census just completed, have a population of 4674. Within the corporate limits of the city there are 1808 people; in the valley outside the city, 2868.

Mosier valley is credited with 625 people; Cascade Locks with 402, and Viento 64, a total of 1033, which added to the combined population of Hood River valley gives a population of 5707 in the district embracing the one time proposed Casco county.

The total population of Wasco county is found to be 15,895, distributed among the various precincts as follows:
