Method of Party Organization.

Section 43 of the direct primary law provides as follows for party organization:

'There shall be elected by each political party subject to this law at said primary nominating election a com-mitteeman for each election precinct. The committeeman thus elected shall be the representative of his political party in and for such precinct in all ward or subdivision committees that may be formed. The committeemen elected in each county shall constitute the county central committee of each of said respective political par ties. Those committeemen who reside within the limits of any incorporated ondants. city or town shall constitute ex-officio the city central committee of each of said respective political parties, and shall have the same powers and juris-diction as to the business of their several parties in such city matters that the county committee has in county matters, save only the power to fill vacancies in said committee, which power is vested in the county central committee. Each committeeman shall hold such position for the term of two years from the date of the first meeting of said committee immediate-ly following their election. In case of a vacancy happening on account of death, resignation, removal from the precinct, or otherwise, the remaining members of said county committee may select a committeeman to fill the vacancy, and he shall be a resident of the precinct in which the vacancy occurred. Said county and city central committees shall have the power to make rules and regulations for the government of their respective politi-cal parties in each county and city, not inconsistent with any of the provisions of this law and to elect the county members of the state central committee and of the congressional committee, and said committees shall have the same power to fill all vacan cies and make rules in their jurisdic tion that the county committee has to fill county vacancies and make rules. Said county and city central committees shall have the power to make nominations to fill vacancies oc-curring among the candidates of their respective parties nominated for city or county offices by the primary nominating election, where such vacancy is caused by death or removal from the electoral district, but not otherwise. Said committees shall meet and organize by electing a chairman and secretary within five days after the candidates of their respective parties shall have been nominated. They select managing or executive may committees and authorize such sub committees to exercise any and all nowers conferred upon the county, city, state and congressional central committees respectively by this law."
