He is a brother of Thomas Brown, living about 11 miles west of Goldendale, with whom he was living. J. R. Putnam, justice of the peace of Goldendale, was sent to the scene of the tragedy to hold an inquest but deemed it unnecessary. Mr. Brown was a bachelor of about 53 years of age.

SEES SAMPLES AND
WANTS MORE PEARS

Fred Detz, who went East last spring to superintend the construction of a large normal school building at Mayville, S. D., writes as follows about the receipt of some Hood River apples and pears, sent to him by Mr. Schall, his son-in-law:

"Mr. Schall sent me a box of Hood River pears and a few Gravenstein apples. The pears were beautiful—not only beautiful, but delicious as well. I distributed quite a number to some of my old friends here and in every case they caused exclamations of surprise at the size and beauty.

"Express charges on the box were \$3.50. Notwithstanding this exorbitant charge, Colonel Robinson, upon receiving three of them, sent an order at once to Hood River for a supply for his own use.

"I enclose clippings in regard to the fruit from both of our local papers. You will notice Brother Stewart mentions only one pear. I afterwards took several in a small basket intending to leave them at his residence. I mistook the house and learned afterward that I left them at Dr. Dupuis. Well, it was 'one' on the editor, but they 'done the work' just the same.

"I learned today from a gentleman just from Fargo that according to his estimate over 80 per cent of the wheat along the track is still uncut and will undoubtedly be a total loss. This was occasioned by the existing wet season. Just think of riding in a train through our immense wheat fields in the night time and watch the moon sail along in the wheat fields as it was reflected in the water.

"I suppose before this reaches you you will have met Judge Ames of this place, as he and Mrs. Ames left here about two weeks ago intending to visit Hood River before they return home. I am getting a little homesick for Hood River, but from present conditions, don't see how I can get away much before Thanksgiving, and perhaps even Christmas.

"Fred Detz, superintendent of construction of the new addition to the Normal school building, was distributing a basketful of samples of a few of the fruits raised on the fruit farm of his son-in-law, Mr. Schall at Hood River, Oregon, last Saturday—pears and apples—and favored the Tribune with four of the pears. They were fine pears, of a beautiful color and taste to match. A couple of them weighed very close to a pound. Mr. Detz is an enthusiastic Oregonian now, though he still has a warm place in his heart for his former home, North Dakota."

Origin of the Word Multnomah.

The meaning of the word Multnomah as is the case with many other Indian names is largely enveloped in mystery. From the best information obtainable, however, the word, as now spelled, is an corruption of a word that Indian linguists spell in their own way. "Nun-ah-wil-lah" and signified "down river." The name was originally applied to the river flowing through Portland from the falls at Oregon City to its junction with the Columbia, the term Multnomah referring to the river above the falls to its source.

The home of the Multnomah Indians embraced the region north of the Clackamas river extending to the Columbia east to the Cascade mountains, and west to the summit of the hills westward of Portland. So far as known there is not a single member of the Multnomah tribe of Indians now living.

A good many years ago the writer secured a photograph of an Indian who is believed to have been the "Last of the Multnomahs," an engraving of whom accompanies this brief sketch. His name was John, but in time he came to be known as "Old John," a d his "illahoe," or country was about ten miles east of Portland on what is now known as "Columbia Slough." He died in 1893, and is believed to have been fully 100 years old, and perhaps a little over.

He remembered Lewis and Clark, and their party, and always claimed that they gave him a little iron skillet which is now in the custody of the Historical Society. He was always a friend of the whites in the early days and manifested this friendship in no uncertain way when the Indian war of 1855-56 occurred. When the Indians were driven away from Columbia Slough he refused to say anything would rather stay with the white people.

He made his home on the Wilkes place, an adjoining farm, until a few years before his death when he was taken to the county poor farm. He hoed potatoes at 50 cents a day and tanned hides for a living until he became too old to work.

He was always a welcome visitor at the home of the early pioneers, and he was well versed in the legends and folk-lore of his tribe. It is a matter of great regret at this time that some one could not have been interested forty or fifty years ago in securing from him everything he could relate regarding the traditions of his people.

It is fitting since this was not done, that the name Multnomah should be perpetuated in so many ways, and in no way more significantly than through its adoption by the favorite athletic club of this beautiful city.
