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OUR DELEGATES AT LA GRANDE

PROMINENT PART IN CONVENTION

Fruit Growers Re-elect E. L. Smith President and A. L. Mason Vice President—Valuable Papers.

A. L. Mason, E. L. Smith, E. H. Shepard, G. R. Castner and J. L. Carter, who went from this city to attend the convention of the Northwest Fruit Growers, returned Friday, the convention having held night meetings and thereby shortening the session one day.

The delegates all report having had a most enjoyable trip and say that most valuable information was brought to light by the papers which were read on fruit culture. The Hood River delegation took a most prominent part in the proceedings of the convention and their views and advice on the fruit business was much sought for by the other delegates in attendance.

MADE BANQUET BRILLIANT AFFAIR

Hood River Commercial Club Entertains Guests at Social Function That Proves Most Successful

Saturday evening was a red letter one for Hood River, for with music, a feast of good things to eat and a flow of oratory and wit the social lines of town and country were abolished. The residents of city and valley have joined hands in the common cause and have put their shoulders to the wheel for the further development of the innumerable resources of Hood River valley.

The banquet given at the Mt. Hood Hotel by the Commercial Club of this city on that evening was the cause of cementing the interests of the two communities, it can be designated as such. The invitations issued by the club for the affair were eagerly accepted by those who received them, and when the time arrived for gathering at the festive board about 125 persons were present to do justice to the fine supper which Manager Gilbert had prepared for the occasion. The city orchestra was stationed in one corner of the large dining room, and during the progress of the meal entertained the guests with an excellent musical program. After this speeches were made and stories told and a great merriment was witnessed until the affair wound up with three rousing cheers for Hood River that no doubt were heard re-echoing up the valley to the very base of Mount Hood with reverberations at Mosier and White Salmon.

ORATOR, MUSIC AND FEASTING

The members of the club and their guests met at the club rooms at 8 o'clock, where President Davidson made a short talk explaining the object of the banquet, which was the bringing together of the business men and fruit growers throughout the valley for the purpose of developing the influence of the organization by taking in members in the out of town districts and thus making it a body representing the whole valley. The proposition was met with such enthusiasm that before the gathering was ready to depart for the banquet hall 43 new members were added to the club's list.

At 9 o'clock the banqueters formed into line and marched to the hotel, where the principal speakers of the evening who had been asked to address the club were waiting. They were Judge C. A. Jayne, president of the Portland Commercial Club; Tom Richardson, secretary of the same organization; Hon. E. L. Smith, Rinaldo M. Hall, advertising manager of the O. R. & N.; Walter Moore, of the Oregon Savings Bank; and of Portland, and Roswell Shelley of Orel and M. P. Isenberg of Belmont.
