MET DEATH WHILE SHOOTING STUMPS

A fatal accident occurred on the ranch of the Hood River Fruit Company, Monday afternoon, about 1:30, in which J. H. Johnson lost his life. Johnson, in company with Ben Lacey, was engaged in clearing land and they had been working the stump puller. The stump had been removed from the vicinity of the one they were using for a stump puller and Johnson was getting in a hole to fix it out. He was working along at the time and it is supposed that in tamping to the ground around the charge he struck the cap with the lamping iron.

Just when the accident occurred is not known as his companion, knowing that Johnson still had some work to do, did not pay much attention to him for a moment. Finally, however, when he did not put in an appearance Lacey went down to discover what was detaining him and came across Johnson's handily. He had been killed instantly as his neck was broken, a great hole torn in his back and his right leg fractured.

The unfortunate man was employed in the neighborhood of the logging and work of a similar nature for some time and was familiar with the use of explosives used in removing stumps.
