## STATES HIS POSITION IN COUNTY AFFAIRS

For the information of a number who have asked pertinent questions in regard to A. A. Jayne's position on matters affecting the interests of the various sections in the county the Glacier man interviewed the Hood River candidate for the nomination of representative recently. When told that some of his constituents would like to know if he still considered that Mosier would form part of the pro-posed new county Mr. Jayne said: "Since the residents of the Mosier district held a public meeting and the majority of those present voted against county division, they have decided the matter and their wishes must be respected. There was no intention or lesire on the part of any one as f r as I know to persuade or coerce the Mosier people to come into the new county if it is created. The only offort made was one to present the econ-omical benefits that would accure to them. If the new county is now created the line must necessarily be placed some where between Hood River and Mosier. "

When asked if he would support the bill to extend the portage road into The Dalles if elected he replied:

"Yes, I will support the bill. I did so at the last session of The legislature although I was never consulted about it. When it came to a vote I voted for it and will do so again. I consider that it is a benefit to the county generally and for that reason is a good measure. Statements that I worked against the bill are without founda-tion and have only been made to mis-lead those who do not know the truth in the matter. You may say for me that in the event of my election I will support the measure if it is again brought before the house."

The creation of the new county has raised the question as to what judicial district it would be in. On this

point Mr. Jayne said:
"The new county would undoubtedly remain in the seventh judicial district. I have heard statements that it would be to its interests to be-come associated with Multnomah county, but I do not share in these views. The legal interests of the views.
