Crook county coal is said to be all right. The recent discovery of a five-foot vein near Hay Creek is said to be of good quality. Prospect holes have been sunk at different points and it is claimed that coal has been uncovered for a distance of five miles.—Journal.
In a recent lecture Prof. S. A. Beach, of Iowa, said the best land for an apple orchard is one which contains clay subsoil, porous enough to let water pass through. The premature falling of leaves in orchards during the wet season is often due to a lack of air in the soil.
The Glacier is in receipt of a box of magnificent black cherries from the orchards of H. C. Bateham. The name of the variety is unknown, being too sweet for Tartarian and too early for Black Republican or Bing. They would be hard to beat for an early shipping cherry and Mr. Bateham is planning to bud quite a number of his trees to this variety.

The cherries in the valley will be very short, in fact, there will be practically no cherries. But few trees have any fruit, and the frequent rains have cracked open much of the fruit that is on the trees.
Hood River will play ball at Columbia Park next Sunday with the Schillers, the crack amateur team of Portland. Several additions will be made to the Hood River team, and a good game is assured.
The G. A. R. encampment will be held at Grants Pass, June 20, 21 and 22. The Southern Pacific has made one and one-third fare from all points. Tickets will be good till June 27, with a stop-over privilege at Roseburg on return trip. Everybody can avail themselves of this privilege.
H. M. Gould, of The Dalles, an old pioneer resident of this section since 1857, visited Hood River for the first time in five years. He was astonished at the progress made in this city in that time and said that we were making much more rapid progress than The Dalles.
Snow & Upson are still covered up to their eyes in work. An unusual amount of work in their line is being done this year, both in the new work and general repairs. Among the new work just finished we notice a new trunk box for the Green Point logging Co., made to order to fit the particular uses of that company.
E. S. Lewis, of Ontario, Cal., spent several days in the valley, with a view to locating. He comes here in the interest of a colony of Southern California people, who will probably come here if the report is favorable. Mr. Lewis was especially pleased with the upper valley, and has about made up his mind that Hood River is all right.
The Chicago Record-Herald says: The beneficial effects of the raise of saloon licenses from \$500 to \$1000 a year were shown today when it was announced that more than 1,000 saloons had gone out of business; that the revenues of the city from this source would be over \$300,000 more than under the old system.
A gang of Japs working on the railroad grade near Dee got into a row Friday and the affair wound up by K. Lewis was receiving several cuts on the arms and legs. He was brought down on the Mt. Hood train and placed in the Hood River hospital, where his wounds were dressed and sewed up and he is on his way to recovery. The Jap, who did the cutting has left this part of the country.
A tough on the local Saturday at tempted to get away with a box of berries from one of the boys that sell berries at the trains, but the marshal was too quick for him and made him pay. Earlier in the week several men got off the night train and made a rush at Ivan Dakin, who had a basket of sandwiches, scooped up a handful, and jumped aboard. One of the gang also grabbed a hat from a boy and carried it along. A couple of days in jail for the offenders would help to stop such practices.
Alex Reid, who has one of the contracts for logging at Green Point finds it an easy job to keep the pond full of logs, on account of the good preparations made for logging, and the large quantity of timber that is being cut near at hand. He rigged up very powerful donkey engines, and planned this work in a business-like way. Everything is now running very smoothly at Green Point, although the mill is in operation only on the day shift, with both sides of the mill sawing timber. The cut is from 125,000 to 150,000 feet per day.
