New Naturalization Law.
 A new naturalization law takes effect September 24th and The Dalles Chronicle says that the law is much more strict than the one now in force. It provides among other things that the applicants must be able to speak, read and write the English language and notice of their admission must be posted for 90 days. The applicants must so file with the clerk a certificate from the immigration bureau, showing when they landed in this country, how they came and that they are in the country legally. Under the new law first citizenship papers are good only seven years, when they expire unless final papers are procured in the meantime.

"Canned" Labor Not Profitable.
 Just what Twoby Bros. and other contractors are "up against" in securing labor was evident to Colonel Crossen and C. A. Borders, who timed a fellow whom they turned loose on the street to serve out a fine. In five minutes the fellow had dumped ten shovels full, when an ordinary workman should have handled twenty five.
