**HOOD RIVER GOOD ENOUGH FOR HIM**

J. M. Cooper, who has been living at Fort Gibson, in the Cherokee strip, is at Hood River with the intention of locating here. Mr. Cooper's son, Arthur, is employed in the warehouse of the Davidson Fruit company, and has been here a year. He was accompanied to Hood River by another son, W. R. Cooper. He was in the Glacier office one day last week and his admiration for the Hood River country and the climate is unlimited. His talk was interesting, not only about the valley, but also about conditions in the strip of land that home-seekers sought for when it was opened for settlement. As to conditions in the Cherokee strip Mr. Cooper said: "Conditions there are very bad. While many parts of it are fertile, crops have proved uncertain and climatic conditions are not reliable. The principal crops have been cotton and potatoes. The cotton crop is a failure about two years out of three, owing to the cold weather and potatoes have not proved a profitable crop there either. For some time there has been a struggle going on to secure the residents want the territory created into a state, but there is an element of grafters that want it to remain as a territory. This has been a great drawback to the country and has worked against its development. "Before I left there I was told that I would freeze to death in Oregon, but in all my travels, not only in the west, but in the south, for I am a native of Georgia, I have never found a finer climate than that at Hood River. Why, it is surprising to me to find that there is no frost in the ground. I was out in the country today and picked apples that fell from the trees. If I can make the proper arrangements I propose to bring my wife here and stay. This is good enough for me."

**FORM MERCANTILE ASSOCIATION**

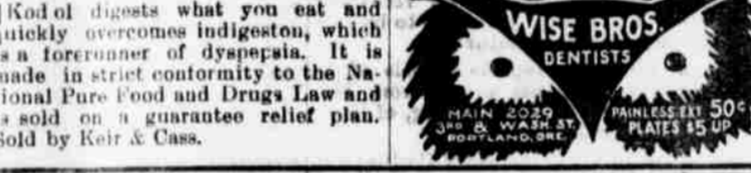
League in that city many tributes had been paid to the little city for its progressiveness, which he thought was due to its fine fruit combined with judicious advertising. The benefits of an organization were manifold and it was the hope of the state body that it could form an association in every town in the state. During the recent session of the legislature the association had been successful in securing legislation that was beneficial to the retailers and had come very near having the pure food law passed. It had passed both houses but was vetoed by the governor. The law was a good one and with the prestige of a better organization in the state they hoped to pass it at the next session. He believed that an association would help Hood River merchants and the community at large and stated that professional and business men in other lines than groceries were eligible to membership. J. A. Estes, one of the directors of the state association, said that he had been in the south when the cotton fields were in bloom but in riding over the valley his imagination had pictured to him what a beautiful sight it must be when the apple trees were in bloom. It seemed to him that it was most remarkable that a little place which figuratively speaking, could be covered with the palm of the hand had made its way known all over the world. Nothing he said but their excellence could have done this coupled with an organization that stood together and helped each other. He had always been interested in an organization of retail business men. The association in Portland had had a very small beginning but it was now in most flourishing condition, the meetings were well attended, it had promoted good fellowship among its members, helped them in adjusting prices and proved most beneficial in every way. Several gentlemen representing the wholesale houses were also present and at the request of the chairman made short talks all of which were in favor of organizing. Among them were P. C.
