Law Affecting Notaries.

Department of the interior, general land office, April 29, 1907.

Registers and receivers, United States land offices.

Sirs:—Your attention is called to that part of the act of June 29, 1906, (34 Stat., 362) which reads as follows:

"That no notary public shall be authorized to take acknowledgments, administer oaths, certify papers or perform any official acts in connection with matters in which he is counsel, attorney or agent, or in which he may be in any way interested before any of the departments aforesaid."

Although this statute forms a part of the act of congress amending section 558 of the code of law for the District of Columbia, it has recently been construed by the attorney general to apply to notaries outside of that district, and you are therefore directed to scrutinize all affidavits and papers filed in your office for the purpose of seeing that they are not executed in conflict with this statute.
