The object to be obtained by the expense of any considerable amount of morey in this direction is a permanert of the year randing for steam and other craft, also a suitable dock or which host that would be accessi-ble at all stages of the water, and a location less runde than the present isolated one Most assuredly this would not be obtained if Capt. Spencer's ideas were carried out, as at ; medium high stage of wa or the road-way to the upper landing becomes in passable as most persons know and, too, the construction of a t-a -tory dock that would withstand the heavy en ent that sets in at that point the high water stage would be expensive and require constant expense and at tention for its preservation

I have the opinious of several experienced rivermen that a channel of sufficient size for any craft plying the river at present, could be diedged from low water clear up to the rail-road right of way, and by diverting a portion of the stream of Hood river into it to kept practically clear all the year around.

The prime object, as I see it, of such a move, would be the business to be derived therefrom, and I cannot see where any advantages would be had over the present conditions by carrying out Cart. Spencer's ideas. If we had a landing all the year such as we have in high water where the boats come right up to our doors, and a commodious dock where freight and passenger traffic could be handled expeditiously, it would mean much to us as a city. The impression that the tourist has of Hood River when the hoats land at the present mud bank dock, is not one that will enhance the pressure of our valley to any great exprestage of our valley to any great ex-tent, and the number of people that daily travel the river who would rath-er come nere to do their trading if they could do so without having to walk or ride a mile through the dust or mud, and who rather than do so go on up to The Dalles to do their trading, is a matter to be seriously considered, as it means thousands of dollers going right part out, doors not lars going right past out doors year-ly, that we should have. They say you have the goods and we like to come to your town to trade, but your toat landing is so inconvenient we can't do it. It seems to me that now is an opportune time to take this matter of dredging a channel up. The north bank railroad is deeply interested in the matter of freight shipments from this point, and the only way these could be obtained to any extent would be through some acces. way these could be obtained to any extent would be through some accessible source which does not exist at present. They now have a dipper dredge working at the mouth of the White Salmon, that no doubt they would contribute toward the work, and that working in connection with mrs. M. Thorp, of Corvallis, second delegate to the national convention of and that working in connection with a giant which could be connected with Mr. Wilson's pipe line would do the work expeditiously and with a minimum of expense. Some will say the sand will fill in your channel and shoal it every year, that is the experience of tow boat men on the lower river who have constructed similar channels of ten times the length of this one, and in instances where they have no swift running stream to turn into it as we have. But supposing that was the case, could we not easily afford to spend a thousand dollars or more each year to keep it in navigable condition? I am quite sure the people would answer affirmatively affer the first year of its use. 




