YAGDJOGLO J HAS NARROW ESCAPE

A letter received by friends at Portland from Honolulu graphically describes the narrow escape from shipwreck of a tramp steamer on which D. S. Yagdjoglo had taken passage for Vladivostok, and on which were a shipment of Hood River apples for Vladivostok.

From 12 noon Dec. 23 to the 25th inst. the following events occurred: A storm from east-southeast increased into a hurricane, a high sea following steadily higher, and towards 2 in the afternoon we were unable to steer our course any more and we had to heave to and go half speed.

Two skylights of the engine room were blown open, and while we were trying to shut them our quartermaster, Wook He Wong, was blown clean overboard. We immediately threw overboard to him a life-belt, but owing to the high sea and wind, it was quite impossible to stop the ship or turn her around.

When we opened No. 1 hatch a little water was coming into the hold. Towards 8 o'clock we opened No. 3 hatch and trimmed the cargo from port to starboard. Cargo on Tween No. 1 was moved to port. Towards 5 o'clock the ship was a little bit straightened, while we only used the coal in the port bunker.

We repaired by 3:30, substituting a wire hawser for the broken one. The same day, 9:30 in the evening, the steering gear again broke, this time a link in the aft chain parting. This was repaired by 12:30 a. m.

steamer, but as I have in this ship a lot of fresh fruit from Oregon and California for Vladivostok, and as it is very cold at that place now, I decided to accompany my cargo, so as to be able to see to the careful unloading.

I have been by no means idle, as during those trying times I had to do a great deal of work. I was able to help in trimming the coal to balance the ship.

Owing to the continued bad weather we were compelled to change our course from the northern route for the southern route, and we are now bound for Honolulu, where we shall stop a few days for coal and for repairs.

I am feeling very unwell and am very nervous as a result of the awful experience we went through between America and here. I was very sick and my nerves are still shaky.

After leaving Portland and Salem our first stop was at Sacramento, Cal., arriving there at 6 a. m. in a dense fog which lasted until about 10 a. m. when the sun came out warm and bright.
