

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY COURT

County court met in an adjourned term this 10th day of December, 1907. Those present were Judge A. E. Lake, commissioners H. J. Hibbard and C. H. Stoughton, and S. Bolton, county clerk, when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of appointing to fill vacancy in board of directors of Hood River Irrigation district, it is hereby ordered that Percy A. Smith be appointed and he is hereby appointed to fill vacancy in the board of directors of the Hood River Irrigation district.

In the matter of creating a voting precinct in Hood River valley, to be called Odell precinct, it is hereby ordered that a new precinct be created in Hood River valley to be named Odell, and described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the SE corner of section 5 Tp 1 N R 11 E W 3 M; thence north two miles; thence east three miles; thence north one-half mile; thence west one-half mile; thence north to Hood River; thence up Hood River channel to section line between sections 6 and 7 Tp 1 N R 10 E; thence following section line due east to place of beginning. Voting place to be at near Odell.

In the matter of the boundaries of East Hood River precinct, which are as follows:

Beginning in the Columbia river due north of the east line of sec 4 T 1 N R 11 E W 3 M; thence south to south east corner of sec 21 T 2 N R 11 E; thence west one mile; thence south one mile to south east cor sec 29 T 2 N R 11 E; thence west 3 miles; thence south one-half mile; thence west one-half mile; thence north to Hood River; thence down said river to north line of sec 36 T 3 N R 10 E; thence west to quarter cor to sections 25 and 36 T 3 N R 10 E; thence north to Columbia river; thence up said river to place of beginning.

In the matter of creating a new voting precinct in and near The Dalles, to be known as South Dalles precinct, it is hereby ordered that a new voting precinct be formed out of East Dalles precinct to be known as South Dalles precinct and to be described as follows to-wit:

Beginning at the intersection of the Kelly avenue and Jackson street; thence south along Kelly avenue to the south westerly line of Dalles City; thence westerly along the said line to the line between sections 9 and 10 T 1 N R 13 E; thence 3 to NW cor sec 15 T 1 N R 13 E; thence west one mile; thence south one mile; thence west one mile; thence south two miles to SW cor sec 32 T 1 N R 13 E; thence east four miles; thence north to the south line of the R R Thompson D L C No 37; thence west to SW corner of D L C No 37; thence north to NE cor of D L C No 39; thence west along the center of Jackson street to the place of beginning, the voting place to be in Dalles City.

In the matter of the boundaries of Baldwin precinct, it is hereby ordered that the boundaries of Baldwin precinct shall be as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point where East Fork of Hood river crosses south line of sec 5 T 1 N R 10 E W 3 M; thence east to south east cor sec 5 T 1 N R 11 E; thence south to south east cor sec 32 T 1 N R 11 E; thence west to north east cor sec 1 T 1 S R 10 E; thence south to the south east cor sec 12 T 1 S R 10 E; thence west 3 miles; thence north to north west cor sec 6 T 1 S R 10 E; thence west to Middle Fork of Hood river; thence down said river to place of beginning.

In the matter of the boundaries of East Dalles precinct it is hereby ordered that the boundaries of East Dalles precinct shall be as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point in the channel of the Columbia river opposite the north end of Jefferson street, Dalles City; thence southerly along the center of Jefferson street to its intersection with Kelly avenue; thence south along the center of Kelly avenue to its intersection with Jackson street; thence east along the center of Jackson street to the NE cor Simms D L C No 39 T 1 N R 13 E; thence south to SW cor of Thompson's D L C No 37; thence east to the line between sections 11 and 12 T 1 N R 13 E; thence south to SW cor sec 36 T 1 S R 13 E; thence east to SE cor sec 32 T 1 N R 14 E; thence north to the center of the Columbia river; thence down said river to place of beginning.

In the matter of surveyors and viewers report on proposed county road of W H Eccles et al, the matter of consideration of views and surveys report on proposed county road petitioned for by W H Eccles et al, continued until January term.

Whereupon court adjudged, A E Lake, county judge, H J Hibbard, commissioner, C H Stoughton, commissioner. Attest—S. Bolton, clerk.

County court convened in regular session Thursday, January 2nd, 1908. Those present were: Hon A E Lake, judge; H J Hibbard, commissioner; C H Stoughton, commissioner; S Bolton, county clerk; when the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of petition of J M Leuz et al, to vacate county road, prayer of petitioners granted and road ordered vacated.

In the matter of the petition of E Henderson et al, for county road, petition road and considered, no remonstrance being filed, it is ordered that the viewers and surveyor meet at beginning point of proposed road and view and survey said proposed road.

In the matter of the petition of J F Stout et al, for appointment of constable in Falls precinct, petition granted.

In the matter of the petition of Thomas Flanagan et al, for appointment of V A Cochran as supervisor of road district No 32, petition granted.

In the matter of petition of Alex Stewart et al, to pay a special tax in road district No 6, permission granted to vote a tax of 5 mills on the dollar for improving county roads.

In the matter of the petition of H G Nielson et al, for permission to vote a special tax in road district No 6, permission granted for a 10 mill tax for improving county roads.

In the matter of the petition of Wm H Edick et al, to have E L Roof appointed road supervisor of road district No 8, petition granted.

In the matter of the tax levy for Wasco county for the year 1907, as certified by the county assessor, the amount of assessment for said year being \$8,220,070, the county court as by law required, fixes the tax levy on each and every dollar of assessable property in Wasco county as follows:—Sales tax, 3 1/2 mills on each \$1 assessed.

School tax, 4 1/2 mills on each \$1 assessed. Library tax, 1-10 mills on each \$1 assessed. County roads, 3 mills on each \$1 assessed. County purposes, 3 mills on each \$1 assessed.

Making the total tax levied by the county court of 14 mills on each and every dollar of assessable property in Wasco county.

In the matter of the petition of W H Eccles et al, for county road, report of viewers and surveyor read, and prayer of petitioners granted, and supervisor of road district No 35 is hereby directed to open said county road.

In the matter of the petition of Geo W Simmons et al, to vote special tax in road district No 6, permission granted to vote special tax of 5 mills on the dollar for road purposes.

In the matter of the petition of J H Koberg for road of public easement, petition read in open court. It is ordered that the board of road viewers and county surveyor meet at beginning of proposed road of public easement, and view and survey said road and assess damages, if any.

In the matter of the jury list for the year 1908, on this day the court reads a list of 200 tax payers from the tax roll of Wasco county, to serve as jurors in the circuit court of Wasco county for the year 1908.
