

CITY ORDINANCES.

ORDINANCE NO. 143.

An ordinance entitled, An ordinance to provide for a special election to be held in the City of Hood River on the 17th day of February, 1908, to provide for the submission of the question whether the City of Hood River shall issue bonds in the sum of \$50,000 for the purchase and improvement of the present water system of the present city of Hood River.

The City of Hood River does a duty as follows: Section 1. That a special election shall be held in the City of Hood River on the 17th day of February, 1908, at which the qualified voters of said city shall vote upon the question of whether said city shall issue bonds upon the credit of the city in the sum of \$50,000 for the purchase of the complete system of water works owned by the Hood River Electric Light, Power and Water Company, at a price not to exceed \$100,000, for the creation of a fund of \$10,000, to be used, or so much thereof as may be necessary, in improving said water system by the City of Hood River, and in reimbursing said city in the sum of \$1500 for money expended by it in the purchase of the Tucker Spring, said bonds to be of denominations of from \$100 to \$1,000, as the purchaser may desire, payable in ten years at the rate of five percentum per annum, payable semi-annually, with interest coupons attached thereto, and in all respects issued in accordance with Section 102 of the Charter of the City of Hood River.

Section 2. The Recorder of the City of Hood River shall give two weeks notice of said election by posting notices thereof in three conspicuous places within the corporate limits of said city, which notices shall contain a condensed statement of the purposes for which said election is called, the date of said election and the place where the same is to be held, the aggregate amount of bonds proposed to be issued, the rate of interest said bonds are to bear, together with the interest payment periods, said notices shall be signed by the City Recorder and such notice shall also be published in two successive issues of the two papers of the City of Hood River for ten days prior to the date of holding said election.

Section 3. The Common Council shall appoint three judges and two clerks for such special election, who shall qualify and hold office as provided for judges and clerks of general city elections. Said election shall be held at the City Hall in said City, at eight o'clock a. m., on the date of said election, and shall be kept open continuously until seven o'clock p. m., of said day. Said election shall be conducted as nearly as practicable in accordance with the general election laws of the State of Oregon.

SPECIAL CITY ELECTION, HOOD RIVER, OREGON.

February 17, 1908. Question: Shall the City of Hood River issue bonds in the sum of \$50,000 for the purpose of purchasing the water system of the Hood River Electric Light, Power and Water Company, at a price not to exceed \$100,000 and for the creation of a fund of \$10,000 for improving the same, and to reimburse the City of Hood River in the sum of \$1500.00 for money expended in the purchase of the Tucker Spring? Mark X in the space before the answer you wish to vote.

For Bonds. Against Bonds. Section 5. As soon as the polls are declared closed the judges and clerks shall proceed to count and certify to the Common Council the result of the vote at said election, and shall publish the result as required by law and if at least two thirds of the votes cast at said special election shall be in favor of bonds, then said bonds shall be issued for such purpose, in all respects as required by the Charter of said city.

Section 6. Inasmuch as the present water supply of the City of Hood River is deemed inadequate, this measure is necessary for the immediate peace, safety and health of said City, and an emergency is hereby declared to exist, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately after its final passage and approval by the mayor. Passed the Common Council of the City of Hood River, this 6th day of January, 1908. Approved by me this 11th day of January, 1908. Signed: L. N. BLOWERS, Mayor. Attest: J. R. Nickelsen, Recorder.

ORDINANCE NO. 144.

An ordinance providing for the improvement of streets and alleys in the city of Hood River by the city; and further providing for the improvement of said streets by the property owners.

THE CITY OF HOOD RIVER DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS: Section 1. Whenever the Common Council shall provide by ordinance for the time and manner of improving any street or alley, and the estimate and specifications for the work to be done thereunder shall have been made in duplicate, and the original of such estimate or specifications, or both, as the case may be, shall have been filed in the office of the City Recorder, and the duplicate thereof placed in the office of the Street Commissioner for inspection, the Committee on Streets is hereby authorized to advertise for proposals and enter into a contract on behalf of the City of Hood River for furnishing the material and performing the labor necessary for the completion of the proposed improvement according to the provisions of the ordinance providing for the time and manner of making the same, subject to the restrictions and regulations hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The work of improvement by grading or paving any street or alley shall be let by contract to the lowest responsible bidder, who shall give a bond to the City of Hood River in such sum as may be determined upon by the Street Committee, not exceeding the contract price, conditioned for the faithful performance of the work to the satisfaction of the Street Commissioner and the Common Council, with surety approved by the Street Committee; and the provision herein shall be in force by action in and to the satisfaction of the City of Hood River, in the name of the City of Hood River.

Section 3. No contract to grade or gravel any street or alley shall be let

after the recorder, by order of the Common Council, shall have given ten days' notice thereof by publication in some newspaper published in the City of Hood River, or by posting notices thereof in three public places in said city not less than ten days prior to the time of letting such contract.

Section 4. Such notice shall state the time and place when and where bids for such contract or contracts shall be opened and shall refer to the ordinance providing for such improvement by date and number, and shall specify what part of such improvement or repairs shall be let in one contract, and the time within which the same shall be required to be completed; and shall further state that the person, persons or corporation to whom the contract is let will be required to sign an agreement to the effect that said contractor or contractors shall look alone for payment for material and work to such particular portion of the fund to be assessed upon the property liable to pay for such improvement, and paid into the City Treasury for that purpose, as shall be assessed to the property in front of which, and to the charge of which the particular part of the improvement to be done by the successful bidder or bidders, respectively, is to be made, and collected and paid into the City Treasury, and that such contractor or contractors shall in no event require the City of Hood River or any of its officers to pay the same excepting out of such particular portion of said fund, so assessed and collected into the City Treasury for such portion or portions of said improvement nor seek to enforce payment of the same or any part thereof, against the City of Hood River or any of its officers by any legal process or otherwise, and the right to reject any and all bids shall be expressly reserved therein. No bid shall be received after the time limited in such notice.

Section 5. If no remonstrance be filed, the contracts to grade and gravel such street or alley may be let according to said notices. HAZELWOOD BUYS JP PRIZE APPLES

Decorated with blue ribbon, symbolizing the trophies won at the recent exhibit, many boxes of huge apples at the Hazelwood Washington street restaurant are inviting evidence that Portia is at the opportunity of enjoying the finest products of Oregon orchards. Until recently there was a continual complaint that the best Oregon fruit was shipped away and that Portland was served with only second and third class grades. In order to supply the demand for the real thing in the apple line the Hazelwood firm appropriated the large part of the exhibit that was held this week in connection with the annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural Society. The part purchased by the Hazelwood restaurant includes practically all the prize winning varieties of baking apples. "It is from the kind of baked apples and cream that we serve that this restaurant built up the business that it now enjoys," said the manager yesterday. "As an article of food there is nothing, probably, that can compare with baked apples and good cream, provided, of course, the apples are of the right kind. "For a long time it was almost impossible to get the best Oregon apples in Portland, but there is no ground for that complaint now. Last year we baked and served here more than 1000 cases of the finest Hood River apples. "We get only the best, the kind that is shipped to New York, London and other big cities. As a result of our supplying that kind, our business has grown wonderfully and we do not hesitate to say that the present volume of business of this restaurant is due to the kind of baked apples and cream that we serve." The Mountaineer farm at Hood River packs and ships most of the apples used by the Hazelwood street restaurant. Different varieties are used, but the management insists that for baking purposes the Arkansas Black, Spitzenberg and Newtown Pippin are the best. The management has already contracted for enough Hood River apples to supply the demand for the rest of the season, until August. The apples will be put in storage this month. "There are many prize-winning boxes in the management that was purchased from the Horticultural Society. Included in the list are two boxes of first-prize winners from the Marshall orchard at the same place. "One is surprised at the calls for baked apples and cream by people here in Portland," said the manager of the restaurant. "Now that it is generally known that the best varieties of Oregon apples may be bought in Portland, the demand is great and it is growing bigger every day. You are now able to get in Portland restaurants apples as good as are served anywhere in the world."—Telegram.
