Soft Gingerbread. One cupful good Orleans molasses, two eggs, half a cupful butter, a level tablespoonful of soda dissolved in half cupful warm water, a tablespoonful of good ginger, three cupfuls of flour and enough more to make a stiff batter. Bake in a long pan and cut in squares.
