The regular meeting of the Mt. Hood Development League held last Tuesday evening was well attended and proved interesting to all. The road committee reported that work was progressing at both ends of the new road under the watchful eye of Supervisor Rood, the roadway having been cleared out for over a mile, considerable grubbing done and some grading. In the opinion of the committee the road when completed will be one of the easiest and best in the valley, and the road way practically dustless and abraded its entire length. It is hoped that the road will be made at least usable with the funds to be at command when all subscriptions will have been collected and the county appropriation made. It is proposed to notify all subscribers, if necessary, that subscriptions may be paid at Butler & Co's bank, where receipts for same will be left and delivered to the subscribers when the amounts are paid. In this way it is hoped to avoid again approaching the signers and the expense of soliciting. With the money made available at once, work will be vigorously pushed and all possible done while men and teams can be secured. PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED MEETING

The adjourned meeting of the common council was held Thursday evening and routine business transacted. A letter was received from attorneys of Mr. Smith stating that the city had taken the property for the use of a street, had torn down his buildings, cut down trees and laid sidewalks and a sewer through the property and asked that the matter be taken up and Mr. Smith be compensated for his loss. Mr. Smith claimed that he owned the property, but that he was willing to leave the matter to competent engineers to judge. The matter was referred to the finance committee. Ordinance No. 145 was referred to the judiciary committee. Ordinance No. 148 passed its first reading and was referred to the committee on fire and water. It was an ordinance giving permission to the Farmers Irrigating Co. to lay pipes on the hill for irrigating purposes. The following bills were allowed and ordered paid: Dr. Edgington, services health officer, \$20.50. S. E. Hartness, supplies, \$5.71. Glacier, publications, \$20. News-Letter, publications, \$20. A. C. Stevens draying, 25 cents. Oregon Lumber Co., lumber, \$45.57. Ramona Hotel, meals for prisoners, \$4.50. A. J. Derby, legal services, \$7.50. E. S. Hartwig, legal services, \$23. W. Haynes, supplies, \$7.05. Pacific Stamp Works, badges for fire department, \$15.30. J. J. Luckey, repairs, 50 cents. J. R. Nickelson, expense, \$2.85. Transfer Co., team work, \$9.50. John L. Henderson, surveying, \$27. Electric Light Co., lights for January, \$50.75.

Mayor Blowers stated that he had a telephone message from H. F. Davidson asking that he appoint a committee to confer with the representative of the fire underwriters, as to the effect on insurance rates should the city put in fire hydrants. After some discussion of the matter Councilmen Hershner, Wright and Hall were appointed as such committee. The resolution passed at a previous meeting requiring that bills be laid over until the second meeting of the month for investigation, was rescinded, and a new resolution passed that the finance committee meet with the recorder and marshal one-half hour before the first regular meeting of each month to audit the bills. A complaint was made that the post house was a nuisance, that it was the rendezvous for tramps and should be destroyed. The marshal claimed that there was no furniture in the house and that he had inspected the premises recently and found it all right. No action was taken in the matter. A sample of gravel was exhibited from the Spear place, which is being tested by the street commissioner, and it was regarded as of excellent quality. The street committee was not prepared to give an definite report on the matter, until the investigations are completed. J. B. Hunt was present and stated that he had the street signs completed and wanted pieces designated to put them up, so he could be paid for them, and that he could not afford to make several trips over the city at different times. He was directed to put up signs wherever Home Telephone or electric light poles were available, or other places where per-

mission could be secured, and that whenever posts were required to be put up by the city that the marshal could look them up as the posts were put up.
