HOOD RIVER TO LOSE AN OLD LAND MARK

With the removal of the large wood building occupied as a store by H. B. Bragg & Company, Hood River is about to lose one of its oldest and most interesting landmarks.

For many years its broad steps and long stoop have served in the capacity of the meeting place, forum and lounging spot for Hood River's inhabitants and we think it is safe to say that there is not a man in Hood River who at some time has not rested his anatomy on this ever convenient resting place.

As to the building, it was erected in 1882 by E. L. Smith who for a number of years conducted a general store in it. When built it was by far the most pretentious structure anywhere in the vicinity of Hood River.

As a storekeeper of the largest mercantile business at Hood River Mr. Crowell also acted in the capacity of its banker and for several years any very little coin was jingling in the pockets of Hood River residents and the occasion for spending more than two bits necessitated the issuing of an order on Geo. Crowell.

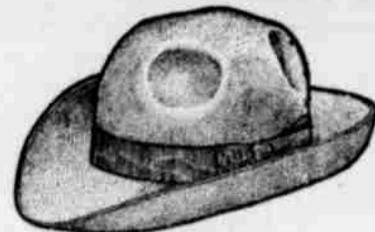
