Milling Co. Declares Dividend. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Hood River Milling Company was held last Saturday. The officers elected for the ensuing year are: I. W. Thompson, president; E. D. Homewood, vice-president and manager; J. G. Gessling, secretary, treasurer and manager in the annual report showed that the business of the company is somewhat less this year than last, owing to a decreased demand for feed stuffs. A yearly dividend of 6 per cent was declared.

First Tragedy of Hunting Season. The first tragedy of the season occurred on the 15 inst., when Frank Baker was shot and killed by a companion, Ernest Venia, while hunting deer six miles south of Pepperwood in the vicinity of Eureka, California. Venia heard Baker in the brush and thinking it was a deer shot him through the shoulder, killing him instantly. Distracted with grief Venia hurried to Pepperwood for assistance. He was so excited that he forgot the way to the scene of the tragedy and a prolonged hunt was necessary before the corpse was located.—Ashland Tidings.
